Apples continue in fairly good supply, tho not much is doing at this time of the year, and potatoes, while high, have shown no marked advance just lately. Opinions differ as to the figures likely to prevail in the spring, tho, unless heavy losses have been occasioned by the severe weather in the pitting; there ought to be an appreciable decline later on. What the average householder would like to see is a general lowering all along the line, but this does not seem likely to come for some time at least.
