Machinery Should Reach Property Next Week - Over a Year's Ore Supply Blocked Out.

COBALT, Sept. 6 .- The framework for the new Swastika stamp mill has CHANGES AT DEPTH been completed and the outside sheetbeen completed and the outside sheeting. This will house the first mill in the new gold camp. Next week the management hopes to have machinery for the mill arriving at the mine. . The mill be built a good deal on the

same lines as the majority of mills in this section. The ore goes thru the crushers direct to a ten-stamp battery and then onto amalgamating plates. From these plates the ore goes thru classifiers to sand and slime tables. The concentrates are then sent back for regrinding and put over the plates again. The tailings from these plates are stored until such time as a suitable process is decided upon for treatment. It is expected tha tithe plates will give a recovery of 75 per cent, while the total recovery of the mill is placed at 85 per cent. This mill should be working by the latter part of next month at the latest. The Swastika kept a small test mill working, from which they recovered

working, from which they recovered considerable ore. The recovery from the dump ore milled was larger, however, and used mostly for testing purposes. At present the management claim to have enough developed ore in sight blocked out on the 100, 200 and 300-foot levels to keep the mill running for a year and a half. This ore is all above the 300-foot level and while the above the 300-foot level, and while the most work is now being done on the lowest level, 400 feet from the surface, none of it is taken into consideration
