





PROPOSED ROBBERY TO FINANCE REVOLT

Montreal Youths Were Determined to Oppose Conscription by Force.

Montreal, March 11--A conspiracy by members of the Montreal Constitutional Club to rob a bank to secure funds to carry on a campaign against conscription was reported by Paul Ranger, the first witness heard when the trial of Elie Lalumiere, Jean B. Cyr, Romeo and Louis Wisnaitiner, Arthur Blackwell, Louis Chagnon, Joseph Paquet, Aurele Goyer and Rene Arsenault and Charles Desjardine, federal detectives, charged in connection with the dynamiting of the Cartierville home of Lord Atholstain began Saturday. Ranger, who is an ex-member of the flying corps, was a member of the Constitutional Club. When he joined it, he stated, he understood it was being formed to oppose conscription before the Military Service Act was passed, by constitutional means only.

DILLON ANNOUNCES POLICY

First Task Will Be to Tell England to Set Her Own House in Order.

Binniskillen, Ireland, March 11.--John Dillon, who succeeded John Redmond as leader of the Irish Nationalists, replying to congratulatory addresses yesterday, said his first task would be to tell England before the world that her statements must cease to talk of a league of nations or pretence to carry on this war in defence of small nationalities unless she first set her own house in order and set free a nation that has for 700 years groined under her misgovernment.

Bolsheviks Ordered Massacre

Of Upper Classes at Odessa

Jassy, Rumania, Friday, March 15--After the Germans entered Odessa on Wednesday, the Bolsheviks embarked on steamers for Sebastopol. Before leaving, Gen. Muraviev, Bolshevik commander in chief, ordered the massacre of officers, capitalists and bourgeoisie, and demanded the payment of 20,000,000 rubles by the population of the city.

AMERICAN TANKER SINKS SUBMARINES

Shell Struck Fairly in Centre and U-Boat Immediately Disappeared.

An Atlantic Port, March 11.--An American tank steamship which arrived here today reported that after battling for one hour with a German submarine on Feb. 24 she succeeded apparently in sinking the U-boat. The fight took place in the Bristol Channel. The American vessel, of about 9000 tons gross, at first tried to outmaneuver the U-boat, but when the submarine began using shells instead of a torpedo, many shots were exchanged before one from the tanker struck fairly in the centre of the U-boat, which disappeared immediately. One member of the crew on the American ship was wounded by a German shell. Two other shots from the U-boat struck the American vessel, which was not seriously damaged. The tanker left a British port on Feb. 23.

REICHSSTAG ON PEACE TREATY.

Washington, March 16.--An official despatch today from Berné said the German Reichstag on Tuesday will discuss the treaty of peace with Russia with Cancellor von Hertling and Foreign Minister von Kuehlmann, speaking for the government. On Wednesday the Reichstag is to vote on the new 15 billion marks war loan, with adjournment fixed for Friday.

VENICE MARTYRED BY AIRCRAFT RAIDS

Italian City Threatened With Vast Destruction by Austrian Bombardments.

Venice, Thursday, March 14.--"Resist, resist, and, once again, resist," is the watchword that rings across the canals, bridges and lagoons of the tortured Queen of the Adriatic. In all her history, so many centuries long, Venice has never endured such martyrdom nor been threatened with such complete destruction as now. This situation has so elevated the spirit of her inhabitants that they have been transformed into so many heroes. In October and November, 1917, after the disastrous retreat from Caporetto to the Piave, the question arose whether to defend Venice or not. Military experts seemed to consider her defence by land impossible and therefore useless to attempt. Some cannons were removed and part of the fortifications dismantled. Since then, however, the people, headed by the mayor, Count Grimani, in whose veins flows the blood of the doges, have claimed sacred right to defend Venice, the historic portal of their

GERMANS SPREAD GLANDERS

Among Argentine Horses

London, March 17--Reuter's Limited learns that there is reason to believe the Germans are following practices, of which they have been proved guilty elsewhere, and are inoculating animals in Argentina with glanders. "The attention of the Argentine Government," says the agency, "has been directed by the British Government to the fact that numbers of horses and mules reaching this country from Argentina are found to be suffering from glanders, a disease said to be virtually non-existent in Argentina. The chief effect of this fresh act of barbarism is likely to be felt in Argentina itself. Owing to the rigorous examination of all animals arriving in this country, all contaminated beasts are discovered before landing."

BUNNING TO VISIT STATES.

London, Thursday, March 14--G. H. Stuart Bunning, secretary of the postmen's federation, has been selected as the British labor representative to accompany the international delegation to the United States.

BARON LOWEN RECALLED.

Stockholm, March 17.--C. F. Hüllgren, a departmental head in the foreign office, has been appointed minister to Argentina and Chile in succession of Baron Lowen, who has been recalled at his own request.

ENTENTE DEMAND WORRIES HOLLAND

Fears Compliance Will Lead to Trouble With Central Powers.

Amsterdam, March 16.--The demands made by the entente on Holland are bitter hard, says The Nieuwe Rotterdamse Courant, in commenting upon the statement made to the states-general by the Dutch foreign minister with regard to the negotiations with Great Britain and the United States. It adds: "Moreover, to grant some of them, as appears from the resume of the discussions with Germany, would lead to Germany refusing to renew the economic agreement with Holland. The future can only be regarded as very sombre."

TO BUY EGYPT'S COTTON CROP.

London, March 17.--The British and Egyptian Governments have decided jointly to acquire the entire Egyptian cotton crop, beginning next August. A commission has been appointed to take control of the regulations.

FIFTEEN RUSSIAN WARSHIPS TAKEN AT ODESSA BY ENEMY

Amsterdam, March 15--A telegram from Berlin to The Koelnische Volkszeitung states that the Germans found fifteen Russian warships in the harbor of Odessa when that city was occupied.

INISFAH BLOWN DOWN.
