From this sum have been paid in cash semi annually the usual Dividends of 6 per cent. to the holders of paid up Permanent Shares amounting to \$47,600,30. After providing for expenses of management, Debenture interest and sundry fixed charges, and setting aside the sum of \$35,361,57 for apportionment to Sinking Fund on Loans and for dividends on Accumulative Shares there has been transferred the sum of \$15,000 to Reserve Fund and a further sum of \$5000 to Contingent Account

Payments of Principal and Interest by borrowers continue to be made promptly and satisfactorily. The whole of the Company's Mortgage Securities, being repayable in fixed monthly, quarterly or annual instalments, are improving yearly. So far, each succeeding year has confirmed your Directors' opinion as to the satisfactory character of the Company's securities, and the safety and effectiveness of its repayment system.

Dr. Sheard's \$304,000 Request Assented to-Mr. Rust's Tall Figures.

The board of control will be asked to endorse the spending during the year of \$304.029.10 on the city's street clean ing and cavenging services, the works committee at its meeting yesterday afternoon falling into line with Dr. Sheard's estimates as prepared, not a dollar being deducted therefrom. Dr. Sheard admitted that he was ask-

ing for \$17,000 more than was spent last year, while an analysis of his report, and that of City Engineer Rust, showed that, as a matter of fact, the excess approximated \$42.000. Last year, \$28.960.55 was the outlay for removing snow from the streets. In the 1906 estimates no appropriation for this purpose is asked at all, but Dr. sheard stated that the absence of snow thus far has caused \$3000 to be expended on street cleaning, which sum would otherwise have been saved. Dr. Sheard explained that the taking in of the Avenue-road and Rosedale districts meant that \$3600 must be added for the extra scavenging, while. Mr. Jones had informed him that the natural yearly increase in the cost of scavenging, due to the city's being built up, was from \$16,000 to \$17.000 a year.

The board approved without question of Dr. Sheard's calculation of \$2 a day as a minimum wase for workmen, on which basis an increase in wages of \$4636.80 for the department is shown.

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
