NEW INSURANCE SCHEME ADOPTED BY PYTHIANS Increase in Maximum Policy to \$5000 and in Age Limit to 60, Important Features

New Orleans, Oct. 24.—New insurance laws, affecting 80,000 policyholders, were officially adopted to-day by the supreme lodge, Knights of Pythias. The feature of these laws are: An increase in the maximum policy from \$3000 to \$5000.

An increase in the age limit at which members can be insured from 50 to 60 years. The creation of a new fifth class of insurance. This class involves a complete change from the old fraternal congress to the American experience table, with interest at 3 1/2 per cent.

There will be an annual accounting, an annual dividend policy, returning to the member at the end of each year all over and above the cost of carrying the risk and expense of management.

All policies under the new system become incontestable after three years. Privileges are given policyholders in the fourth class to transfer into the new fifth class—taking the same amount without new medical examination.

SHAREHOLDERS TO MEET DIRECTORS ALL RESIGN

Yesterday's Developments in Bank Case—Witnesses For To-Morrow's Court Hearing.

W. E. Stavert, the curator in charge of the Ontario Bank, last evening announced that the curator and the board of advisors had decided to call a meeting of the shareholders on Dec. 21.

According to the Banking Act, this is the earliest time that a meeting can be held.

The board of directors of the late Ontario Bank held a meeting yesterday and placed their resignations before the bank for acceptance. They will be acted upon at the meeting of the shareholders, when the number will likely be reduced from 7 to 5.

It is the understanding of many that the Ontario Bank has ceased to be a corporation, but it was stated that the Ontario Bank is still in existence, and that the resignation of the present board of directors necessitates the election of a new board.

The preliminary enquiry into the ways and means by which the Ontario Bank was put to the bad will commence in police court to-morrow, when Charles McGill, who is general manager, and G. R. K. Cookburn, president, will appear.

Crown Attorney Corley has subpoenas sent out for J. M. Courtney, deputy-minister of finance; Walter Fenwick, who was clerk in McGill's office at the headquarters of the bank, and who is supposed to know how the statements were made out and arrived at.

Mr. Courtney will not come to Toronto, but will send the alleged false statements here in charge of a clerk. It will be required of Mr. Stavert that he show from the examination as has been made from the books and accounts that the reports were falsely made and sworn to.

Mr. Stavert has systematized his case into documentary form, in the shape of sworn statements, which will be used by the crown.

CLAIMS LARGE ESTATE. Cook in Detroit Hotel Left Fortune by Hamilton Relative.

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 24.—(Special.)—William Scott, cook at the Brunswick Hotel, quit his job on Wednesday and took a train for Hamilton, Ont., where he will claim a large estate that he inherited from an uncle that died recently in Hamilton.

An attorney arrived at the Brunswick Hotel on Tuesday from Hamilton, and he announced that he was representing the administrators of Scott's estate.

Scott was getting dinner ready when the attorney made known his mission, and he was prevailed upon not to interfere with the work of his uncle after the noonday meal was over. Scott was notified on Tuesday afternoon of the fortune left him, and he prepared at once to go to Hamilton.

COMPANY STORES HURT TRADE. Petitions to Government Ask That Concession be Withdrawn.

Sydney, N. S., Oct. 24.—(Special.)—One of the matters with which the local government will be forced to deal at the next sitting of the house of assembly will be the question of company stores in connection with the collieries in the province.

In Sydney Mines the business people are circulating a petition, addressed to the governor-in-council, asking that this concession be removed from the Nova Scotia Coal and Steel Company, and that it confine its operations to those industries for which the company was chartered.

In Glace Bay a similar agitation is to be started against the company's stores there. It is claimed that these stores have a demoralizing effect on business in general.

TORONTONIAN IN CHICAGO ENDS LIFE WITH A BULLET

Wm. Steward, With Nerves Shattered, Seeks Death—Traveling Companions Held.

Word was received in the city yesterday of the death by shooting in Chicago of William S. Steward, a young Torontonian. At first it was thought he might have met with foul play, but a special despatch from Chicago last night says:

"After having been detained nearly ten hours by the police in connection with the death of William S. Steward, at the Saratoga Hotel, C. O. Cloud and his wife were released from custody shortly before noon to-day. They were, however, compelled to promise to be on hand when the inquest is begun on Friday.

"Both were questioned for some time by Capt. Gibbons and O'Brien, and repeated the story they had first told. Steward was on a pleasure trip with them, and occupied a suite on the fourth floor of the hotel with them. He had been drinking heavily for several days, and his nerves were so badly shattered that Cloud went to a drug store and purchased some medicine for him, but Steward refused to take the drug, saying that he was feeling better.

"A few minutes later Steward said he was going to his room, and shortly after a shot was heard in the bathroom. Mrs. Cloud was the first to reach the bathroom, where she stumbled over the prostrate form of Steward. He died in a few moments, before a physician could be summoned and without speaking to his friends.

"Cloud notified Manager W. L. Hicks immediately, but instead of informing the police of the death, Mr. Hicks telephoned to Coroner Hoffman and obtained permission to remove the body to undertakings rooms at 370 Wabash-avenue.

Steward was about 30 years of age and lived with his mother at 25 Wilkes-street. His father, who was in the drug business, died two years ago, leaving him a considerable sum of money and the son retired from the business as a commercial traveler and took to a life of ease. His uncle, J. J. Hornum, left for Chicago yesterday.

The clouds belong to Rochester, N. Y., and were old friends of the deceased who, it is believed, was making his first visit to Chicago.

WILL GO AFTER RAILROADS. Commissioner Starts Prosecution for Irregular Service.

Winnipeg, Oct. 24.—C. C. Castle, deputy warehouse commissioner, has retained H. G. W. Wilson of Indian Head to institute prosecutions against railroads and elevators in the west for irregularities in handling cars.

The farmers of the west have been complaining loudly of their treatment and as a result of an investigation proceedings will be started immediately.

It is the intention of the warehouse commissioner to strictly enforce the provisions of the Grain Act.

TORONTO MAN ARRESTED. R. G. Smith Alleged to Have Impersonated a Recruiting Officer.

Mobile, Ala., Oct. 24.—R. G. Smith, who says that he is a resident of Toronto, Ont., and a graduate of Annapolis, was arrested to-day on the charge of impersonating a United States recruiting officer.

He was taken before United States Commissioner Cowley and bound over to the federal court under \$500 bond. He is in the navy at Brooklyn on March 4, 1897.

ENGLIENHART TO BE CHAIRMAN. It is understood that the government has decided definitely to appoint J. L. Englienhart, chairman of the T. and N. O. Railway Commission in succession to Cecil B. Smith as soon as that gentleman's resignation takes effect.

LARGEST WHEAT CARGO. Port Arthur, Oct. 24.—(Special.)—The largest cargo of wheat that has ever been shipped out of the world was shipped out on the steamer Snyder at noon to-day. She loaded 382,262 bushels, and took her cargo at Port Arthur and Port William.

FALLS FROM SIXTH STOREY. Hamilton, Oct. 24.—(Special.)—Robert McCoom, laborer, Chicago, fell from the sixth storey of the Bank of Hamilton Building this evening about 6.30, and was so badly injured that he died in a few minutes. He was wheeling a barrowful of bricks on the sixth storey. The barrow hit an obstruction and overturned, throwing McCoom down the elevator shaft to the basement.
