These dealers are willing to pay a cent more per bushel to have a load of oats, or any other grain they feed, than is quoted on the market, rather than waste the time going there to get it. In this way both farm its and small dealers or in fact, large dealers, as some of the maitting companies have been doing this are killing the Toronto grain market, in fact it is mearly dead.

If farmers want a public market, where byers are willing to stand, day in and day out to buy their grain, they will have to patronize it better than they have been doing lately. Where will the farmer be if the public market 's abandone' by the doing lately. Where will the farmer be if the public market is abandoned by the buyers? And this will surely happen if farmers pursue their present way of doing business. The present buyers are on the point of abandoning the market, as they say they are only being used to quote prices to the papers, as a guidance to the small dealers through the city, who will not come on the market, or may a commission to some
