Nlagara Falls, Ont., Sept. 10.-An impo tant arrest was made by Detective Maine of the Ontario police force here at Queenston to-day, on the strength of information received here from Postoffice Inspector Morris of New York City. The man captured is Frederick S. Colbourne, charged from the Postoffice Department at Wash from the Postonice Department at Wash ington, D.C. He was located at a quiet little hotel on the shores of the Niagara-near the historic village of Queenston. Af ter being arrested he consented to return to Washington and stand his trial. He had on his person when arrested nearly \$400. The accused returned this afternooi in charge of Detective Ryan of Washing ton and Inspector Morris. say there were not more than this num-ber. The passengers in the day coach fared the worst. Out of twenty-nine people in that coach only six are known to have escaped. All was confision, and some may have escaped unnoticed.
