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Wheat Market Ruled Steady at Lower Prices.

Chicago Wheat Market Ruled Steady at Lower Prices. Trade was Moderate in Volume and Confined to Both Sides of the Market - Corn, Oats and Provisions were All Lower - Cables were Weak.

Tuesday Evening, June 20. Chicago wheat closed a cent and a half lower than yesterday. Corn, oats and provisions also declined.

Liverpool wheat futures were weaker today, closing 3/4d to 1/2d lower than yesterday. Flour is 3/4d higher.

The total shipments from Russia from July 1, 1898, to date, have been as follows: 53,160,000 bushels of wheat and 15,204,000 bushels of corn, compared with 42,020,000 bushels of wheat and 10,200,000 bushels of corn same period last year.

Receipts of wheat at Liverpool the past three days were 1,400,000 bushels, including 120,000 cwt. of American. Corn same time, 108,000 cwt.

The Crops in Europe. The Liverpool Corn Trade News, June 6, contains little information respecting the crop in Europe, beyond what has been advised by cable. The prospects of the wheat crop up to that date were very favorable in the United Kingdom, France, Germany, Austria-Hungary, Spain, Belgium, and Holland.

Argentina. Mr. William Goodwin, the recognized grain authority on the crop of this republic, writing from Buenos Aires, May 22, thought about half the crop had arrived at the ports. (Note) Taking the stocks then in hand and the exports up to that date, the inventories at the ports since Jan. 1, had amounted to a little over 20,000,000 bushels.

The World's Supply 1898-1900. The Corn Trade News estimates the coming wheat crop of the world 313,000,000 quarters, against 303,000,000 in 1898; that the visible supply in store and afloat on July 31 will be about the same as on July 31, 1898, or 1,100,000,000 quarters to be carried over by farmers and others will be quite 30,000,000 quarters.

The reports as to great damage by drought in Russia are not confirmed but, although the quality of the wheat crop of Russia is a little over one-fourth of the whole wheat area of Russia in 1898. Eighty per cent. of the average acreage of the Empire. Three million acres of oats is about 5 per cent. of the whole area, and 6,000,000 acres of barley is about one-third of the average acreage of the Empire.

The latest report of the Hungarian Minister of Agriculture says that the condition of the wheat crop on the whole was then good, indicating a yield of 40 bushels to the acre, against 32,000,000 bushels in 1898; the ryegrass is estimated at about 32,000,000 bushels, a little less than last year.

Consul Covert of Lyons says there is a certainty of finding a ready market in France for hard wheat suitable for the manufacture of macaroni, spaghetti and similar preparations. This kind of wheat cannot be raised in France, and it is imported chiefly from Argentina, Spain and Algeria.
