The annual annual meeting of the Toronto Canoe Club was held at the club buildings last Saturday evening. The membership as well as the financial position of this progressive institution is in a most flourishing condition. The hon. treasurer's statement shows receipts from all sources to be \$402.40, disbursements \$247.71, leaving a balance in bank, life and general accounts of \$154.69. THE SAME OLD SCRAMAGE

Annual Meeting of the Canadian Rugby Football Union at Montreal.

NO OFFSIDE INTERFERENCE.
New and Complicated Offside Rule Adopted—The Officers Elected.

Montreal, Dec. 17.—The annual meeting of the Canadian Rugby Football Union was held here on Saturday evening. The delegates present were: John Savage, president, in the chair; A. D. Ford, vice-president; A. G. Brooks-Claughton, secretary; Ontario delegates, Messrs. Bayly, Mowat and MacLennan; Quebec delegates, Messrs. Jones, Smith and Rankin; ex-officio, Messrs. Victor, Buchanan and Fitzgibbon.

After the minutes of the last meeting had been read and confirmed, the secretary, Mr. A. G. Brooks-Claughton, read the report of the executive, which expressed regret that owing to the senior championship not having been played for the season had not been a successful one.

Mr. Mowat drew attention to the necessity of drawing up the schedules of the two minor unions so as to avoid a similar misadventure in the case of the test match as had occurred this year.

The financial statement showed a balance at the credit of the union of \$45.58. It was decided to buy 10 backs, to be presented to the Toronto team, who won the intermediate championship.

The discussion of the rules was next in order. The Ontario delegates were a unit in opposing any change in the existing regulations. Mr. Brooks-Claughton's amendments were voted down. The suggestion that the ball be put in by the referee or by one of the quarterbacks was rejected. The only changes in the rules made were the following:

Rule 16 was wiped out, and in its place the following rule was adopted: "No player shall hold with his hands or arms an opponent who has not the ball and when not running at or with the ball himself shall not charge or obstruct an opponent who has not the ball, under the penalty of a free kick to side not offending, or of a scrum if the offence is committed by a player in a scrimmage." A player may obstruct, charge, interfere with or hold an opponent who has the ball.

No player shall back trip, scurge or tackle an opponent below the knee, under penalty of a free kick, and no one shall play in a match wearing projecting metal or gutta percha on any part of his clothing.

The second sentence of rule 10 was wiped out and replaced by: "An off-side player is placed on side (a) when a player has run five yards by the ball; (b) when the ball has been kicked by or for a player on side (a); (c) when one of his side has run in front of him with the ball; or (d) when he has kicked the ball from in front of him, having kicked the ball when he had the ball."

The elections were all by acclamation, and resulted as follows: A. D. Ford, Kingston, president; A. G. Brooks-Claughton, Montreal, vice-president; J. McD. Mowat, secretary.

The Single-Rink Competition.
