The municipal elections in the city ! W yesterday were conducted with much vigor. In the mayoralty contest, Dr. John D. Wilson succeeded in defeating Ald. Edw. Parnell, though the latter made a most creditable run, polling the largest majority in No. 6 ward ever given to any candidate. It is noteworthy that Dr. Wilson got a large number of Liberal votes on personal grounds, though the Conservative machine brought him out and worked night and day to secure his return. A number of disappointed contractors. whose views could not be carried out by Ald. Parnell in the city's interests, were also powerful aids in obtaining a majority for Dr. Wilson. It seems to pay a man not to have an aldermanic record, however creditable, while running for the mayoralty. Some good men have been defeated in the aldermanic contest, and new blood is plenti ful. Of the new aldermen No. 1 ward supplies two; No. 2 ward, one; No. 4 ward one-Mr. Charles Graham, the new comer heading the poll with a very large majority; in No. 5 ward, two (though both had previously sat in the council; and in No. 6 ward, one. No. 3 ward is the only one to send back the three old members.

As was to be expected, retiring Mayor Little made a splendid run for the water commissionership. His associate will be Mr. Wm. Jones, who sat on this board some years ago. The school board will also find several new faces at the next meeting to replace those retiring. Many will regret the defeat of Mr. Charles H. Johnston in No. 4 ward; his place is taken by Dr. Ziegler, who worked hard enough to earn

Col. Lewis was re-elected hospital trustee without an effort on his part. His opponent, Mr. John Bowman, was ill during the contest, and was unable to participate in the public gatherings. The most gratifying feature in yesterday's results is the carrying of the bylaw to provide ample hospital accommodation on the old site in No. 3 ward. Many were afraid that the bylaw would be among the slaughtered innocents, but it had more friends than was expected in some quarters,


