Finlay MacDiarmid, minister of public works and fisheries for Ontario, today, for the purpose of discussing conditions in the fishing industry.

They found, upon comparing notes, that the bass hatching business this season had been practically a total failure both in Ontario and Pennsylvania. At first it was thought there was something wrong with the hatcheries, but the officials are now convinced that the failure was due to a very unusual coldness in the water in the spring, the temperature being only 55, when it should have been 65.
