FORMER MINISTER RESENTS ALLEGATION HE REMOVED LETTERS

Hon. G. Howard Ferguson Gives Evidence At the Timber Probe.

TORONTO, Sept. 30.—Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, minister of mines, was a witness today in the timber inquiry being conducted by Justices Riddell and Lachford, and was on the stand four hours. He will be heard further tomorrow.

Hon. Mr. Ferguson answered the numerous questions put to him by R. T. Harding, the crown counsel, without appearing at all ruffled until the question of missing papers was broached. The suggestion that the ex-minister had been responsible for the removal of certain letters from the files of the department of lands, forests and mines, was warmly resented by him.

"There have been allegations that things had been removed by the minister," Mr. Ferguson said. "I would be glad to know specifically what those letters are. Personal honor is concerned, and I want to know. It is absolutely untrue."

Mr. Harding pointed out that copies of three letters, written at different times, were not in the department. Mr. Ferguson replied: "My secretary removed all that were to be taken away. No letter of a public nature was removed from the department within my knowledge. In my term of five years over a million letters came into my department, and I regard it as a compliment that only a small file of letters were lost. I have gone through my letters, and there is not a letter which, in my judgment, deals with public matters or which should be put on public files."

Mr. Ferguson explained that once a

year the files were gone through and the "dead material" thrown out.

With regard to the matter of W. H. Russell having obtained mining claims to pulpwood land and disposed of large quantities of pulpwood, according to evidence given some time ago in connection with the timber probe, Mr. Ferguson said he did not know Mr. Russell and had no recollection of having met him until this week.

As to the staking of the Black Bay Peninsula for mining locations, Mr. Ferguson said he was with the department when the staking was done, and he stated that this action had been taken upon reports that claims were being staked for the purpose of taking off the timber on them.

Difficult to Prove Fraud.
Mr. Ferguson said the claims had been staked under the mining act, and as the requirements of the law had been met, there appeared to be no authority under which these claims could be interfered with. It was difficult, Mr. Ferguson explained, to prove that a man was acting fraudulently when he made an affidavit of finding a showing of mineral, as had been done in cases probed by the department.

Mr. Justice Riddell pointed out that in the Russell case the evidence showed that there had never been any pretence of doing mining work. The claims had been staked simply for the pulpwood. He wanted to know why steps had not been taken to ascertain what Russell had already done.

Mr. Ferguson said he had already done that. Russell operated to the extent shown during the investigation. When the district in question had been withdrawn from staking the order-in-council in connection with the matter was not made retroactive. It was the then minister's opinion that no action against those who had already could succeed.

PRELIMINARY TRIAL OF THOROLD RIOTERS POSTPONED TO OCT. 8

Three More Men Formally Arraigned At Welland Yesterday.

ALL ACCUSED ON BAIL
Welland Overcrowded by People Anxious To Witness the Trial.

WELLAND, Ont., Sept. 30.—The preliminary trial of the persons accused of having participated in the riot at Thorold on the night of August 16, when an attempt was made to lynch David McNeal, charged with having murdered Margaret Boucock, a four-year-old girl of Thorold, was to have taken place here today before Magistrate Fraser of Niagara Falls, Ont., but was postponed until October 8.

The postponement was at the request of Acting Crown Attorney Jeffrey. In addition to the fourteen arrested before the fire marshal's inquiry was begun at Thorold, three who were arrested later, George Aiken, Bert Bowman and Edward Hackett, were formally arraigned today. All under arrest were admitted to bail.

So great is the interest taken in the trial of the alleged rioters that this town was overcrowded last night and today. Every hotel and boarding-house in Welland was filled up. One belated arrival called up the chief of police at 11 o'clock last night and requested the chief to find him a lodging place.

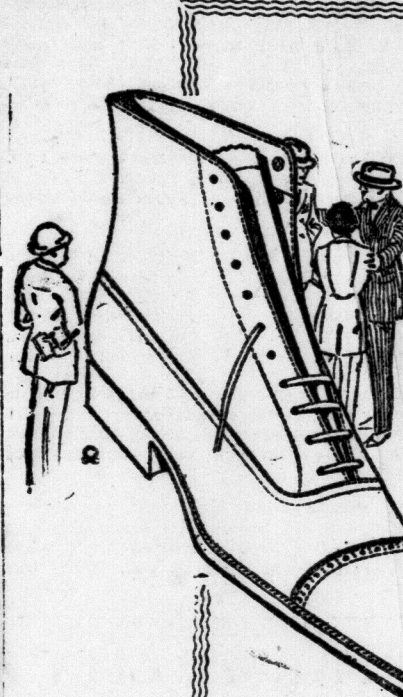
CANADIAN SHOWS UP WELL.

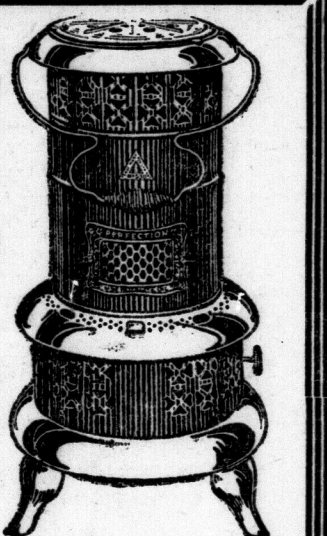
