A. Y. Blain Honored by Legal Profession in Toronto.

A. Y. Blain, who is to-morrow leaving for Alberta, where he has been appointed inspector of legal offices, was yesterday, at Osgoode Hall, made the recipient of a very handsome testimonial from the legal profession of the city. About 50 barristers, together with a number of officers of the Hall, gathered in the convocation hall to say good-bye and wish him God-speed. After Mr. W. J. POISONED BY THE DEAD.

Alex. Broddy Contracted Blood Poison in Peculiar Way.

BRAMPTON, Jan. 8.—As the result of blood poisoning, Alexander Nixon Broddy, a prominent citizen, died this morning.

He was a son-in-law of James Fallis, who died a week ago last Saturday at the age of 77 years from crabs.

When the undertakers took charge of the body, Mr. Broddy volunteered his assistance. As the corpse was being shaved he touched the face of the deceased and afterwards rubbed his own face with his hand. There was a pimple on Mr. Broddy's face and this became inoculated with the poison from the dead man.

Mrs. Broddy was not able to be with her husband for some days lest she, too, would be infected by the poison.

ANOTHER WONDERFUL SHIP.

Will Have All the Conveniences of a Department Store.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Among the innovations which Herr Blain has planned for the New Hamburg-American liner Europa, now being built at Belfast, are a tailor's shop and a modiste's parlor, which will be under the direction of first-class artists from London and Paris. American tailors will also be on board to please those who like English cloth, but not the cut. There is also to be a jewelry store on board.

The Europa is to have a Ritz-Carlton Restaurant, and tanks on deck in which to bring over live soles from Dover and Stettin. If the experiment is a success the Europa will bring over soles for New York restaurants and hotels, as well as for her own passengers.
