## INTEREST IN LACROSSE FALLING OFF

### Blaney McGuire Writes an Open Letter to the Lovers of the National Game.

Blaney McGuire of Orangeville, candidate for first vice-president of the C. L. A., writes the following open letter to the lovers of the national game, winding up in such a practical manner that good results along some lines are sure to be attained:

If you have given any thought to the matter, it has doubtless occurred to you that there has been an unfortunate falling off in the interest in Canada's national game during the past two or three years. This is especially true respecting the game as played under the auspices of the Canadian Lacrosse Association. The reason for this, I do not think it can be on account of the residence rule, as it was in the smaller towns and villages, where skilled players are necessarily few in number, that the feeling was strongest. Of course, there are those who hold that the N. L. U. is responsible, through its policy of the adoption of amateurism by means of money inducements. Another reason advanced is the growing interest in lawn bowling. This has undoubtedly had some influence in Orangeville; of other places I, of course, cannot speak.

Spurred altogether from these outside influences, it seems to me that the association has itself made a mistake in the juvenile series in having the full complement of twelve players on the field. There are usually plenty of juvenile players to choose from, so that difficulty in getting a team cannot be urged as a valid reason for reducing the number from twelve to ten. The latter number detracts from the game, even with ten men a side on the field, but when there are, perhaps, three or four players from each town on the fence it is very difficult to keep the game from dropping into the hands of the interest for the spectators. This was well illustrated during the game between Newmarket and Hespeler at Scarboro Beach last autumn. The strain of the extra running and long passing, due to the reduction in the number of players, most of whom were mere boys.

Instead of reducing the number of players, it seems to me that every practicable means should be used to induce as many juveniles as possible to play the game. For if the depleted ranks of the intermediate and senior clubs are to be filled, the new players must come from the juvenile clubs.

Again, there are those who hold the ground that the lack of interest in the game has been brought about by the extent at least by the unwise policy of some of the members of the C. L. A. Judiciary. While there may be instances where mistakes have occurred, I do not think that much importance can be attached to this argument. The officers of the association have usually been men at heart, and who labored unselfishly for its promotion along the best lines.

Notwithstanding the above, I have every faith in the future of lacrosse in Canada, and am of the opinion that a general revival of interest would follow if some substantial encouragement were offered through the C. L. A. by those who have played and still love the game.

In a matter of fact, there is no adequate trophy open for competition in the intermediate series at the present time. The trophy should be a trophy of some value, which could be won and held from year to year by the clubs in this series. The Shield did much more years ago to stimulate interest in the senior series, and I am convinced that a trophy worth, say, \$50 or \$60 would go far to revive interest in the intermediate series. Such a trophy would be much more in keeping with the importance of the game in this series than the paltry medals, worth about \$3 apiece, that the association presented to the members of the team last year. The money could be easily raised by donations from various sportsmen, owners and managers of lacrosse and pleasure grounds in the cities, towns and villages; the presidents and officers of the association, and lovers of the game who might desire to contribute. Donations could be sent to Mr. W. H. Hall, 12 Elm Street, Toronto, secretary-treasurer of the C. L. A., to whom I have forwarded the sum of \$15 as my contribution towards the cost of a trophy such as I have suggested.
