#### WATERWORKS BYLAW AROUSES OPPOSITION

Ratepayers Say Council Are Working in the bark-No Expert Evidence - County Doings.

NORTH TORONTO, June 1 .- (Special:)-"An insult to the intelligence of the ratepayers" was the opinion of one North Toronto citizen yesterday when asked his opinion of the \$25,000 by-law to be voted on on Saturday next.

"Imagine a body of intellectual men asking the people to vote for such a sum without having secured the opinion of an expert. I voted for the bylaw submitted last January for \$5000. This was understood to pay for land on which there was said to be considerable water, yet no sooner is this passed than the council comes back for another \$25,000 for another block of park lands on which they have no authentic information that they can get any more water than they could on the first piece bought."

A former member of the North Toronto council, speaking on the same subject, said: "If half the money the people are now asked to vote was spent on the town's present waterworks property for providing proper reservoirs, an ample supply for the present needs of the town could be obtained. The water from the Stibbard property all passes thru the town's land and can be caught at a small expense."

In a canvass of many of the prominent town's ratepayers, only sae was found who said he was going to vote for the bylaw on Saturday, and even he was not satisfed that the scheme is what it should be.

The World yesterday asked W. G. Ellis what he thought concerning the proposed bylaw.

"As to whether the waterworks bylaw should pass," said Mr. Ellis, "I would say that the more I give this question consideration, the greater is my opposition to the bylaw. Briefly: When reservoirs to hold water were constructed alongside the springs, they were only of a temporary and wasteful character."

"When excavation work was started, the workmen had trouble with quick-sand, so the reservoirs were made very shallow, not deeper than four feet and on top of five feet of quicksand. Consequently, when these reservoirs fill up during the night, water is at the same time running away thru at least five feet of quicksand and other pervious material underneath. Again, when they were constructed, the pumping plant was not in place. If it had, a better job would have been done, as the quicksand could have been kept pumpjuicksand could have been kept pumped dry while work was in progress. Such a difficulty would not now be ex-

"I am sure it is possible to very largely increase the water supply from our own springs, and if Councillor Reid's request to have our engineer make a thoro report of the situation had been granted.
