## TYPHOID FEVER GROWING FROM CONTAMINATED WATER

Smallpox Banished From the Province Reported at Meeting of Board of Health.

The provincial board of health continued its sessions yesterday, and there were present the chairman, Dr. Kitchin, Dr. Cassidy, Dr. Oldright, Dr. Douglas, Dr. Boucher, Dr. Thompson and Dr. Hodgetts (secretary).

Dr. Hodgetts' fourth quarterly report was presented at the morning session, and after discussion was adopted. It showed a marked increase in typhoid fever, the most prevalent disease in connection with infectious diseases. This has been proven to result from contamination of water sources, no pains being taken in country districts to prevent the contamination of streams from pollution. Municipal authorities are warned that what have been pure sources of water, with the exception of a few cases, are now contaminated. The danger of the pollution of milk supplies was particularly pointed out by the washing of milk cans in the well water of the farm yard, where the typhoid germ often occurs.

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
