AROUND THE WORLD

## YACHTING

Twenty Yachts to Start

Monday's Boston Transcript says:—Twenty of the yachts cruising in the New York Yacht Club are likely to start on Monday, Aug. 21, in the ocean race of the Eastern Yacht Club, from Marblehead to Halifax. There are sixteen boats entered, nine of which will carry the New York Yacht Club flag, and others are expected to enlist a week. P. F. Brewster's new schooner Elmina, Arthur P. Lake's schooner Corona, William S. East's schooner Agatha, W. Ross Proctor's schooner Minnie, S. Reed Anty's schooner Doris, the schooner Stephen's Bay's yawl Vigilant, and Henry T. Sloan's auxiliary schooner Idler are the ones that have been declared to start. Besides these, W. Gould Brokaw's yawl Sybarita, H. Roger Maxwell's schooner Yankoe, A. V. de Gioria's schooner Yaneador, George W. Haven's schooner Vegemere, Henry W. Putnam, Jr.'s schooner Ariadne, and Lloyd Phoenix's schooner Ingrid are likely to be named. The Elmina will start against the Corona, and John W. Harris' schooner Chanticleer of the Eastern Yacht Club and William E. Leelin's Emerald may be the contender. The Vigilant and Sybarita would make probable the best contest of the race. If the Yankoe does not start the Minnie will race against the yawl.

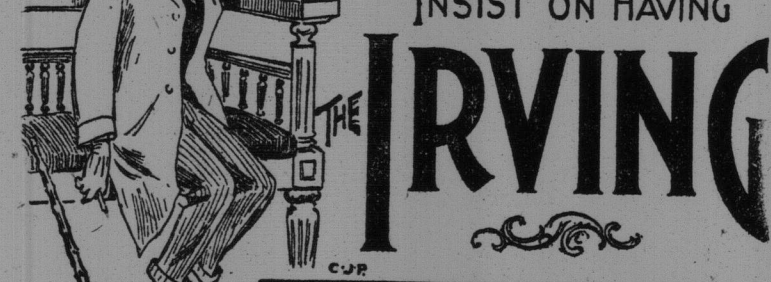
