Troy, N.Y., Feb. 25.—Archie Rogers, of Poughkeepsie, representing the Newburgh (New York) Wheelmen, won the annual 26-mile skating Marathon at Cohoes this afternoon, smashing all world's records on the 20th mile. His time for 26 miles was one hour, 25 minutes and 22 seconds, supplanting the mark established by John C. Karlisen at Minneapolis, Minn., Feb. 6, 1916. Rogers' fastest mile was the 24th, which he covered in two minutes, 52 seconds flat.
