A Fredericton despatch says that Dr. George R. Parkin and Mrs. Parkin of London, England, arrived there this morning. Dr. Parkin is one of New Brunswick's most distinguished sons and one of the prominent alumni of the U. N. B. Graduated as B. A. in 1867, he was given the degrees of M. A. in 1867, he was given the degrees of M. A. in 1872 and L. L. D. in 1894 and in 1911 was honored by the University of Oxford which conferred upon him the degree of D. C. L. From 1872 to 1889 he was principal of the collegiate school in Fredericton, now the Freedricton High School. In 1892 he was Canadian correspondent for the London Times. In 1896 he became principal of Upper Canada College and four years later was appointed a Rhodes scholarship commissioner.
