It is not generally known that out of the twelve thousand species of birds scattered over the globe, the Province of Quebec reckons nearly 300 which pass through or make their homes in its territory. Among these 300 species there are birds whose only role is to provide pleasure for the sportsman; birds which possess economic utility; birds which protect the general granter invests, birds which sess economic utility; birds which protect the crops against insects; birds which adorn the landscape by their coloring and their songs, and, lastly, birds whose importance is rather vague. Although sportsmen worthy of the name almost always hunt for the sake of hunting, it often happens that the game which they kill comprises wild birds from which a profit of some kind is derived. There are quite a number of more or less large, birds whose sole role appears to consist in enriching the ornithological section of the fauna. Amongst these come the golden cagle, owl, raven, crow, falcon, hawk, jay, and heron.


