CANADIAN MILLS INCREASE
PRODUCTION OF WOOD PULP

In this time of war it is gratifying to know of industries which keep up and even increase their rate of production. This latter is the case with the pulp and wood-pulp industry of Canada. The consumption of pulpwood in Canada increased nearly ten and a half per cent in 1914, as compared with 1913. Since 1910 the increase has been one hundred and four per cent. The sixty-six active pulp mills in Canada in 1914 consumed 1,234,876 cords of pulpwood valued at \$8,689,988, while, in addition to this, 973,608 cords valued at \$8,680,490 were exported in an unmanufactured state. Canadians will be gratified to know that the proportion of pulpwood made into pulp in Canada to that exported in the raw state is increasing, thus giving more employment in Canadian

mills. In 1914, 55.7 per cent of all pulpwood produced in Canada was made into pulp in Canada and 44.3 per cent was exported, chiefly to the United States. In the raw and unmanufactured state a few years ago only one-third of the pulpwood produced in Canada was made into pulp here.

The proportion of pulp made by the chemical process is increasing as compared with pulp produced by the ground-wood process. This is gratifying because the pulp thus produced is worth about two and a half times as much as ground-wood pulp. The chemical process also permits a wider range in the selection of timber for pulping purposes, an important factor in bringing into use as many as possible of our native Canadian trees.

The above and all the other facts now known about pulpwood and wood-pulp production in Canada, are contained in the Bulletin "Forest Products of Canada, 1914: Pulpwood" which has been compiled by the Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior and which has been sent to the printer for issue as soon as possible. Copies of the bulletin may be had free upon its completion and those interested in the pulp and paper industry, who desire in the meantime information upon any particular point will receive the same by writing to the Director of Forestry, Department of the Interior, Ottawa.

ROBLIN'S APPEAL TO ROGERS FOR AID; TELEGRAMS READ

Winnipeg, June 29.—M. H. McLeod, general manager of the Canadian Northern Railway, was the first witness called when the royal commission investigating the parliament buildings graft met this morning. His evidence was charged to throw further light on the recent destruction by fire of the G. N. W. Telegraph's telegraph building on the hearing. C. P. Wilson, Liberal member for St. John's, put in telegrams, sent over the Canadian Pacific Telegraph. They read:

Winnipeg, April 21, 1915.
Hon. Robert Rogers, Ottawa.
Confidential. Telegram received. Commission meeting this afternoon. Say they are going to talk evidence at once, very necessary that judge leave tonight. Most important, cannot tell the effect of a day's delay. Might be very serious.

ROBLIN.
Ottawa, April 21, 1915.
Hon. Robert Rogers, Ottawa.
Confidential. Commission proposes beginning inquiry immediately. This makes necessary judge be here at once. Have you arranged? This most important thing in whole matter.

ROBLIN.
Ottawa, April 21, 1915.
St. John's, April 21, 1915.
Have arranged with Sir William that Philpott leave tonight, taking with him Mr. Tilley whom Mr. Rogers and Lash and also every person else claims to be the ablest lawyer in Canada. Philpott's idea is to have Tilley take the case in the court and he to work on the outside. This I presume will be satisfactory. Tilley undoubtedly very able and no doubt if absolutely necessary Philpott will go in as well.

There was another message which Mr. Wilson said would be read later. Mr. McLeod, whose evidence was brief, said he had received messages from the G. N. W. Telegraph and had turned them over to E. D. Anderson, K. C., who subsequently returned them to him. Rogers Got Telegrams From Philpott.

Mr. Anderson then made a statement: "Early in June," he said, "Mr. Rogers sent me and asked me to get for him copies of certain telegrams which had passed between Roblin, Coldwell, Montague and himself. He asked Mr. McLeod for copies of these messages, which at a later date were handed to him. He, in turn, delivered them to Mr. Rogers, who asked for messages between Dr. Simpson and himself. These also Mr. Anderson secured. Subsequently Mr. Rogers returned part or all of them, and he gave them back to Mr. McLeod. Mr. Rogers, he said, made the explanation that some of the telegrams had no bearing on the parliament buildings, but he did not seem then for some time and would like to see them contained."

SCIENTIFIC ASSESSMENT.
L. H. Olsen, of the Canadian Appraisal Co., addressed on Monday a meeting of the Halifax Board of Control regarding the introduction of a scientific tax assessment system. He said his company would furnish a staff to introduce a system and complete it or go so far with it as the city desired. The compilation of the 120 maps necessary would cost about \$2,000. Mr. Olsen was requested to put his proposition in writing.

THE NOVA SCOTIA AEROPLANE.
At a meeting of the Halifax Overseas Club the advisability of inaugurating a systematic campaign for the purpose of raising the balance of the aeroplane fund was discussed. Conversations will be appointed and concentrated efforts made to raise the amount now required \$2,800 (approximately) without further delay.

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RIFLE WAS SHOT OUT OF HIS HAND BUT HE WAS NOT HURT

James Carter, Westmorland Soldier, Writes Home of Battle of Ypres

Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Carter of The Glades, Westmorland county, have the following letter from their son, James, who was in the great fight at Ypres, June 7, 1915.

I have been in action for about three months and have been in some hard places. I was all through the battle of Ypres. It was certainly an awful struggle and a wicked set too. I hope I shall never see as many of our boys go down again, for they fell in heaps on every side, but we made a name for old Canada that she should never forget and I am sure the Germans won't try us again in a hurry for we certainly put fear in them if we did lose heavily.

The odds were ten to one and they pressed us half to death with gas, but there wasn't one got back alive. There were Germans lying in the air, but we put in telegrams, sent over the Canadian Pacific Telegraph. They read:
