**Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.**

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any time, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

### CATSUP FROM GANNERY REFUSE

Use of Benzolate of Soda Allows Fiithy Sweepings to be Canned and Eaten

(From Pure Food Question and Canned Goods in July Canadian Home Journal).

Tomatoes, says a high authority, are more extensively canned than all other vegetables put together—and all the canning is done in a period of six or eight weeks under high pressure. In these also are more extensively used in condiments, sauces, etc., than any other fruit or vegetable—the consumption of tomato catsup running into many millions of bottles annually. In canning tomatoes, there accumulates a great amount of waste, skins, cores, and seed, which there is no time or inclination to care for and which falls under foot disregarded—a source of germs and disease. Hundreds of thousands of barrels of this refuse made in a season would find its way through the sewer, or be dumped into the water.

It is scooped up in shovels from reeling floors, pulped, and put into odd, second-hand barrels of various sizes. Under conditions that would better be left to the imagination than described and preserved against actual putridity will be benzolate of soda. It is safe to say that no one would eat a benzoated article after seeing this material and its treatment.

Tomato catsup, soup, baked bean sauce, at about \$1.00 per barrel, to be made into fresh, ripe tomatoes, "prepared with 1-10 of 1 per cent. benzolate of soda." Other waste products of fruits, etc., undergo similar treatment and are put to similar use in preserving. Such goods are extremely profitable, being sold to the trade at only a trifle less than goods made of the raw materials.

Benzolate of soda does not "conceal inferiority," but it permits disguised inferiority and the grossest fraud. Contrary to much misleading published information, neither vinegar, salt, sugar nor spices will serve to take the place of benzolate of soda for the purpose for which it is used.

With benzolate of soda present, commercial capacity is further aided by the elimination of all need for factory sanitation and care in cooking, and as much water may be left in, to further cheapen a product, as suits the convenience of its maker. Bottles and containers need not be washed and sterilization becomes a useless expense.

This statement is verified by the United States Department of Agriculture (Bulletin 119, June 1909), which says the bulk of tomato catsup is made of this material and in this way.

Those who wish to avoid the nauseating messes accompanying as pure food under the present administration of our Food Laws, should read all food labels carefully—including the fine print in which the humiliating presence of benzolate of soda is announced. There are plenty of pure brands to buy.
