MARITIME BADMINTON TOURNAMENT WILL OPEN HERE TOMORROW

STAR PLAYERS ENTERED FROM MANY SECTIONS

Entry List Contains Names Of Over 100 Competitors

The stage is all set for the Maritime badminton tournament, which opens tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock under the auspices of the Maritime Badminton Association. The present championships mark the fourth annual tournament of the association and it is expected that from the interest already displayed throughout the Maritimes and the keen competition that is anticipated that the tournament tomorrow and Friday will eclipse previous efforts.

There are more than 100 entries but arrangements have been made by the committee in charge to have the games run off as quickly and conveniently as possible.

Play will start Thursday morning at 11 o'clock. It was announced last evening that the courts would be available for practice an hour previous to the opening game of the schedule. Play will continue from 11 o'clock until 1 p.m. from 2 until 6 in the afternoon. Play will be continuous throughout the evening, starting at 8 o'clock.

The schedule has been so arranged that all preliminaries and semi-finals will be concluded by Friday evening, when the finals will be staged.

SHREVEPORT, La., March 15.—Outfielder Johnny Mostil of the Chicago White Sox is destined shortly to take his place as the greatest outfielder in the American League.

That is the opinion held by his manager, Eddie Collins. No one much better qualified to pass on the merits of "Bananas," as Collins years ago nicknamed Mostil.

Last season Mostil improved 100 per cent. over the Mostil of 1924. In spring training Collins made that prediction and Mostil more than lived up to the advance notices his manager had painted for him.

This year Collins is more than ever won over by the remarkable possibilities of Mostil.

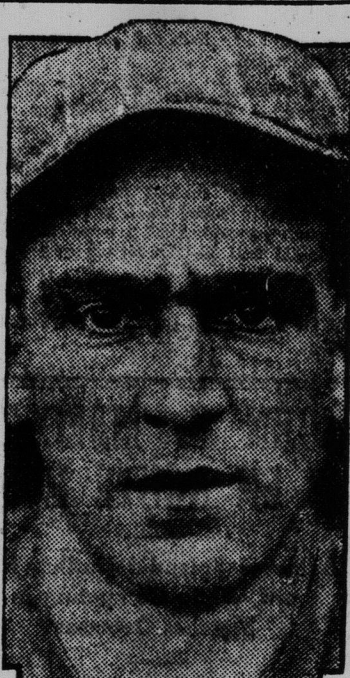
The White Sox fans were always wild about "Happy" Felsch. Well, in another year, perhaps it may be two, they will be telling you that Mostil is a better man.
