ST. JOHN INSTITUTIONS ARE REMEMBERED IN WILL

Rev. B. McKeaney of Massachusetts Leaves \$2,000 to Father McMurray of Woodstock in Trust for Good Shepherds and Mater Misericordiae Home

(Special To Times)
Boston, April 6.—The will of Rev. Bartholomew McKeaney, pastor of the Roman Catholic church in Northville, Mass., on file in the Hampden county court leaves \$2,000 in trust to Rev. Francis J. McMurray of Woodstock, N. B. for the Order of Good Shepherds and the Mater Misericordiae Home in St. John.

Father McKeaney's library and other personal property are left to Father McMurray, who is cousin and executor. Father McKeaney leaves an estate of \$65,900. Of this \$20,000 is left to the executor to distribute among missionary priests in China, India and Africa, these clergy in return to say masses for the testator and his departed parishioners. The church receives \$30,000 for educational and parochial work.

The school for signalling, which has been progressing favorably for the past few weeks in the south end armory, will be brought to a close next week, when an inspection of the signalers, who have been attending, will take place, conducted by Major Lister, of the permanent force.
