

DEATHS

Hon. N. M. Jones.

Hon. Nathaniel M. Jones, for some time general manager of the Nashwaak Pulp and Paper Co., Ltd., located here, died suddenly at his home in Bangor, Me., yesterday morning, after an illness of only two days. His son Sidney M. Jones, of this city, left Saturday night on receipt of word of his father's illness and arrived in Bangor before the State Senator had passed away. He was conscious up until the last minute. He is survived by his wife and one daughter, Miss Harriet, in Bangor, and one son, Sidney M., of St. John.

In addition to being a director of the Nashwaak Pulp and Paper Co., Ltd., the late Senator Jones was president of the Maine and New Brunswick Electrical Power Co., vice-president and director of the Lancaster Land Co., vice-president and director of the Marysville General Stores, director of the Merchants National Bank, Bangor, Me., and president of the Avon Coal Co.

He was born at Turks Island, West Indies, in 1858, and was educated in the public schools there. He began his career as clerk for T. J. Stewart & Co., Bangor, Me., and later had charge of a pulp mill at Howland Falls, Me., in 1890.

He was also an inventor of a digester lining which for several years was the best of its class. It was a money-saving device and was introduced into nearly all the leading pulp mills of the country.

He disposed of his interest in the Howland mills and other plants in

1885, to devote his whole time and attention to the development of the Katandin Pulp and Paper Co., Lincoln, Me. He was also a member of the executive board of the State of Maine Survey Commission and vice-president of the Maine Insurance Co., Portland. He represented Howland in the State Legislature, 1890-91; Lincoln District, 1897-98; he was a member of the State Senate, 1899-1902; entered Governor Hill's Council, 1903; later was with Governor Cobb, 1905-06, and during this term was chairman of the Council.

He sold out his interests in the Katandin Pulp and Paper Co., in 1910, and spent several months on the Pacific Coast investigating a site for a paper and pulp mill. He decided after looking the situation over that the east offered a better opportunity than did the west.

On his return he took over the Alexander Gibson Railway and Manufacturing Co., properties from the Nashwaak Lumber Co., comprising about 400,000 acres of the best spruce land in New Brunswick, situated mostly on the Nashwaak and Bartholomew rivers, and formed the Consolidated Pulp and Paper Co. These properties were subsequently transferred to the Edward Partington Pulp and Paper Co., which he joined in 1912. He assumed the general management in 1916. The Edward Partington Pulp and Paper Co., Ltd., interest was purchased by the Nashwaak Pulp and Paper Co., Ltd., controlled by American capital. Senator Jones was director and manager.

His wife was Miss Hattie J. Hawthorne, a daughter of J. B. Hawthorne, Bangor. He was a member of the F. & M. M. Thirty-second Degree; F. O. O. F., Knights of Pythias and was a Presbyterian.

Mrs. George G. Seely.
Mrs. Margaret Seely, wife of Captain George G. Seely, passed away on Saturday evening at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Walter D. Thompson, 15 Waterloo street, with whom she has made her home for the last four years. Mrs. Seely had lived to the advanced age of 86 years but for years had been in poor health so that her death was not unexpected.

Captain and the late Mrs. Seely had enjoyed 57 years of married life, having spent 50 years of that time in West St. John, removing to the east side about a year ago. During her long residence in West St. John Mrs. Seely was a member of the Charlotte Street Baptist church, and as a sister in the church she took an active interest in the work of the church. But her sphere of service was pre-eminently in the home. In the fellowship of her husband and children she found her greatest happiness, and in unselfish ministry to them, her highest mission.

Mrs. Seely was respected and esteemed by all who knew her, and beloved by a wide circle of friends. She leaves her husband, two sons,

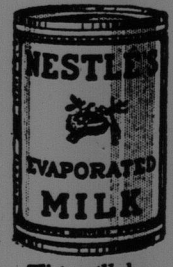
