Draft Will Be Sent To United States

Baldwin Says Copy of Reparations Reply to Go to Washington - Papers Much Disturbed Over Premier Poincare's Attitude in Regard to British Offer.

London, July 16.—Premier Baldwin announced in the House of Commons today that he would communicate to the U. S. for its information the draft of the reply he was preparing to the German reparations. Mr. Baldwin's statement was made to J. Ramsay MacDonald, the leader of the Labor opposition, in reply to the latter's question.

The reception given by Mr. and Mrs. W. Edmond Raymond at their residence in the city of St. John was attended by a number of the executive of the Women's Canadian Club, of which Mrs. Raymond is president.

London, July 16.—A had impression was made by Premier Poincare of France in the address he delivered at St. John yesterday, which is generally regarded as an indirect reply to the outline of Great Britain's reparations policy made by Premier Baldwin in the House of Commons last Thursday.

The Daily News fears there is little hope that France will receive the British proposals favorably, but deprecates an attitude of despair in the British press.

The Daily Express regards the speech as putting an end to "Great Britain's high hopes" of seeing the country cut loose from European connection, but at the same time getting what it can from the European connection.

ALLIES SEEK TO Break Deadlock


