## Great American Leader Dies

William Jennings Bryan, an American orator, statesman, journalist and political leader, died suddenly on July 26th, at Dayton, Tenn.

He was born on March 19th, 1860, at Salem, Illinois. He entered College at an early age and here his remarkable ability found an outlet. Upon graduating he studied law. After practicing his profession for five years he became a popular Democratic Campaign orator. In spite of much criticism, Bryan was very determined and a hard worker. He fought vigorously in the discussions on the tariff and free silver. After running for United States Senator and being defeated, he became editor of the Omaha World-Herald, through which he still expressed his opinions. Three times he aspired for the Presidency of the United States and was each time defeated. He has been called the second "Great Commoner" in American history. He had a great influence in Woodrow Wilson's nomination and election as President of the United States and as a recognition of his services he was appointed as Secretary of State, in which office he continued until 1915.

He has recently come before the eyes of the public as leading counsel for the prosecution in the evolution case at Dayton. Here he confronted Darrow, champion for the accused murderers, Loeb and Leopold. He went to Chattanooga on Friday to attend to the printing of the speech which he was not allowed to deliver at the trial at Dayton. He retired to his room on Sunday afternoon for a rest and was found dead at 4.30 by a servant.

Thus closes the remarkable career of one of the most outstanding figures in American history—the career of a man who spoke the truth without fear or favour, even though it resulted in defeat for himself.

## REMAINS BROUGHT BY "MEIGLE"

The remains of the late Abram Snow, of Country Road, who died suddenly on Labrador were brought here on Tuesday, July 28th. Through the efforts of Mr. C. E. Russell, M.H.A., the S.S. Meigle called at this port with the body. The funeral took place on Wednesday to the C. of E. Cemetery, Coley's Point, Rev. E. M. Bishop officiating. We learn that the remains of the late John Newell, of Barened, which were also brought by the "Meigle", were taken to St. John's, where preparation for burial was made.
