Honest, Pure-Minded Sir Charles Tupper is Placed Under a Cloud.

Bankers Conclude Their Convention - Montreal Herald Changes Hands.

The B. C. Delegation Interview the Government With the Greatest Success.

Ottawa, Sept. 11.-The debate on the estimates yesterday was enlivened by a little tit between Mr. Lister and Sir Charles Tupper. Mr. Lister hinted that it was not improbable that the events would show that Sir Charles benefited pecuniarily when in London by the negotiation of a certain loan.

Sir Charles was on his feet in an instant and created a laugh by demanding that Mr. Lister should at once make such direct statements as would make his Sir Charles, immediate arrest. Hon. Mr. Foster came to his fallen chief's rescue with a similar demand, but Mr. Lister could not be induced to show his hand at present. A number of civil service estimates were then passed.

The bankers concluded their convention yesterday. Mr. Wolferstan Thomas, manager of Montreal Bank, Montreal, was elected president. The next meeting will be held at Niagara Falls.

James S. Brierley, of the St. Thomas Journal, has just bought out the Montreal Herald, and will undertake the task of putting it on a new basis. The report of the board of visitors of the Royal Military College, dated Nov. 18, 1895, and signed by W. Powell, J. T. Duchesne, H. Smith and Duncan McPherson, which report the late government suppressed, has been published.

The report of the board of visitors of the college produced to the board it is necessary for the well being of the college and in the interest of the country that several of the staff should be replaced by better men, and first of these is the commandant officer. It is clear that he does not take an interest in his work and does not exercise that supervision over those under him which he should exercise.

The Fraser River delegation, supported by Messrs. Morrison, Maxwell and Bostock, waited on Minister Tarte this morning, making a strong case. An exploratory survey was granted without any conditions and an appropriation for the preliminary expenses unhesitatingly allowed. An engineer will be sent out immediately. The government expressed the greatest confidence in British Columbia and are willing to grant every concession that the province upon its representatives. The provincial government will co-operate.

A delegation of mining men met here today with the object of establishing a mining bureau at Montreal. Hon. Mr. Laurier met them afterwards, but as they had no proper scheme prepared, with no clear idea of what they wanted, the difference of opinion was so great that the premier said he could make no definite statement on the matter. Senator McInnes, Mr. Earle and Hon. Col. Baker addressed the meeting.

MORE TROUBLE BREWING. Fears for a Renewal of the Recent Outbreaks in Constantinople.

Constantinople, Sept. 11.-Fears are entertained here of a renewal of the recent disorders. These apprehensions have caused a panic among the general public. Shops at Galata and Stamboul were closed at an early hour to-day owing to a rumor of fresh manifestations being organized. Trade is almost at a standstill and the lack of money in the Turkish treasury is a serious feature of the situation. Fifteen army officers who went to the war office to claim arrears of pay were informed that there were no funds with which to pay them. The officers thereupon resigned their commands and were promptly arrested for doing so.

THE NILE EXPEDITION

The Anglo-Egyptian Forces Are Now in Full Swing Towards Dongola.

A Stirring Tale of British Pluck, Endurance and Perseverance.

Interesting Description of Gunboats Which Will Play Such an Important Part.

Cairo, Egypt, Sept. 11.-Dispatches just received from the front say that the North Star Division, numbering 900 men, arrived at Koshah camp, the southernmost fortified post on the Nile yesterday. They are to be pushed forward to Assarrat with the main body of cavalry.

The dervishes are still in view south of Dongola, but the enemy retreats at the slightest sign of a forward movement. Anglo-Egyptian scouts are feeling the way for the advance guard steadily and are pushing on to Kasher, 14 miles farther south, which will be the next place occupied.

All the troops, black and white, are full of enthusiasm and anxious for a brush with the enemy. The weather is hot in the extreme, the soldiers are benefiting from being on the move. All the troops taking part in the expedition are now on the march towards Dongola. Dongola, hitherto held by a small force of cavalry, is being fortified and added to the string of camps connecting the expedition with Wady Halfa, the real base of supplies.

The intelligence department reports that the dervishes are gathering in force north of Dongola, and clashes between the dervishes and Anglo-Egyptian scouts are expected at any moment. Thus the advance of the British-Egyptian expedition up the river Nile, with Dongola, if not Khartoum, as the objective point, now in full swing, after months of struggling with the terrific heat and cholera, during which the work of railroad building and passing the gunboats in sections up the river and over contracts has been carried on incessantly by the troops, under the leadership of British officers, a number of them having already given up their lives as a sacrifice to the task undertaken.

The operations began in March last, when troops were hurried on to Wady Halfa, the southernmost post. Although the railroad ran to Sarrah, about 40 miles south of Wady Halfa, since that time the railroad, desert campaign line, has been carried on incessantly by the troops, under the leadership of British officers, a number of them having already given up their lives as a sacrifice to the task undertaken.

Another motion defeated was that presented by the Amalgamated Society of Tailors, regretting the action of a number of co-operative societies who refuse to accept fair trade union prices, and instructing representatives of the joint trades union and co-operative arbitration committee to increase their efforts to secure a more harmonious relationship between two movements which have so many interests in common.

The congress defeated a motion made by the National History Union that the method of voting shall be by the delegates present in congress either by show of hands or ballot, but that no delegate have more than one vote.

As to-day's session it was decided to send two delegates to the American Labor Congress. It was also resolved that the British Trades Unions Congress will meet in Birmingham in 1897.

A BALLOON ON FIRE.

Mishap to an Aeronaut Making Ascensions for Display.

New York, Sept. 11.-Several persons on Ward's Island about 6:30 o'clock saw a large balloon about 800 feet in the air drifting to the southwest. When about 300 feet south of Nigger Rock the balloon was seen to be on fire. In an instant it began to descend rapidly and striking the water at Hell Gate, sank immediately.

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AGAINST PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The government officials are urging the foreign residents of the city to sign a memorial thanking the Sultan for the protection his majesty has afforded them. A number of Englishmen have consulted Sir Phillip Currie, the British ambassador, as to the advisability of signing the memorial, and were advised by the ambassador to tear up the document and throw the pieces into the faces of the officials who presented them.
