FRANK MINES IN OPERATION. Part Affected by Fire Will Remain Closed for a Few Weeks.

A dispatch to the Nelson Daily News from Frank, Alta., dated April 27th, says: "After a few days of inactivity the mires of the Canadian-American Coal & Coke Company are again running full blast. The first that started in one of the rooms some time ago is now under complete control, the entrance to the burning rooms having been closed. Nearly all the miners are at work closed.
