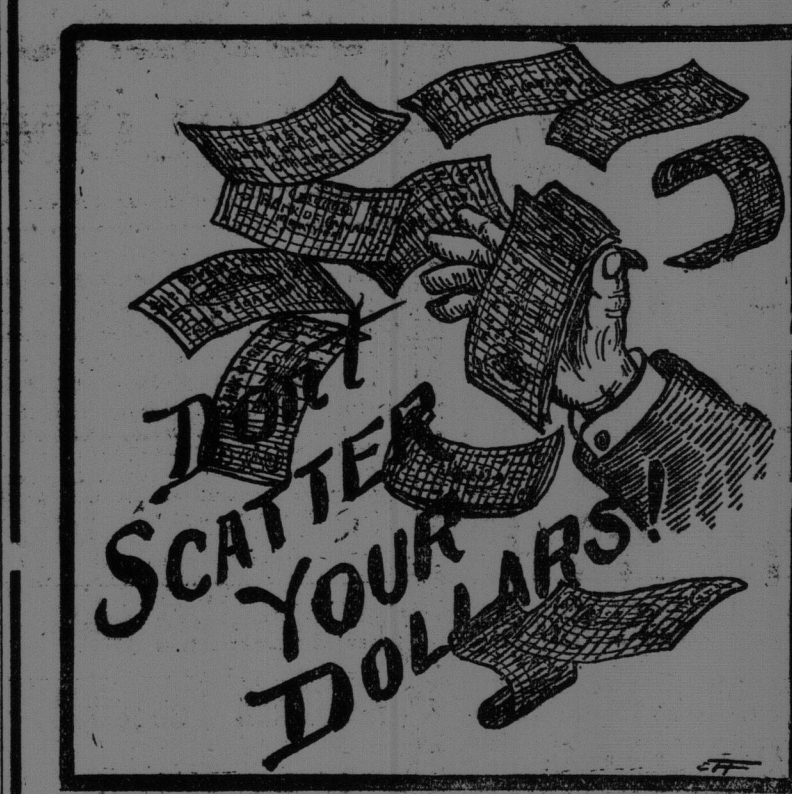

# GEORGE PRICE, MEMBER OF PARIS CREW, PASSES AWAY

Deceased Had Been Ill for About Six Months and His Death Was Not Unexpected—Leaves a Large Family—He Became Famous as a Member of the Paris Crew, Once Champions of the World

After an illness lasting six months George Price of the world-famous Paris crew passed away at his home, 54 King street, West End, last evening at 8:30 o'clock. For some days past the deceased had been in a precarious condition and the end was fully expected.

As a member of the famous Paris crew, the deceased enjoyed a wide acquaintance. During Mr. Price's sickness Dr. Curran has been in attendance almost daily. The deceased is survived by four sons and four daughters. The children are: Mrs. Captain Warnock, John W. Price, Captain George Price, James H. Price, Mrs. William Gregory and Mrs. Harry Rochester. Two brothers, Captain William B. Price and Captain James Price, are also left to mourn.

The deceased was born in the seventeenth year of his age and was in the employ of his majesty's customs. He was a son of the late Captain Price and was brought up as a fisherman and ship carpenter. Particularly on the West side he was well and favorably known, and his familiar figure has been much missed.

With the death of Mr. Price the only surviving member of the Paris crew is Elijah Ross, also of the West Side. The arrangements for the funeral had not been completed last evening. The sympathy of the city and province will go out to the bereaved family, who have lost a kind and loving father.

George Price first came into prominence as an oarsman when he had attained his nineteenth year, as a member of the Sand Point crew. This crew was quite fast, and headed Mr. Price, was composed of William Lambart, Edward Toole and a brother, James Price. Mr. Lambart and James Price are still alive. About this time Mr. Price engaged in several contests, participating in the "boys' race" on the Kennebecasis River.

He was about twenty-nine years of age when he was taken in as a member of the Paris crew in 1867. Previous to this the crew had consisted of Robert McLaren, Elijah Ross, Samuel Hutton and Robert Fulton. However, in the winter of 1867 Mr. McLaren's father passed away, and he being the oldest of the family, had not the time to devote to rowing. Mr. Price was taken in as how to replace McLaren, and rowed with the crew until it was disbanded. He was the latest in the crew of the older members, but proved a valuable oarsman.

Three-quarters of an hour after the finish of this race the out-rig race was brought on and again the local four proved their superiority, despite their previous efforts in the large contest. In addition to the Paris crew there were seven other crews, including crews from London, Oxford, Cambridge, Bolton and two French crews. No other scullers started in this event. The Paris crew were the only ones who competed in both races. The course in the out-rig race was straight-away for about two miles. The London crew, on to the local men until about half way down the course. When two-thirds of the distance had been rowed, Mr. Ross' outrigger upset. The crew lost two strokes on account of the mishap and the London crew came up on even terms. During the remainder of the course the Paris crew put forth extra efforts and went under the bridge a winner by about three lengths. London finished second and the Oxford four in third position.

After the races the crew remained for a week in Paris and then returned to Southampton, where they had been training for the race. They had return tickets to New York on the steamer Baltic, but pleased the local men and were compelled to remain until the next sailing. The crew returned to St. John about the 18th of July, 1867. They left for Paris on the latter part of April, the race being rowed there about June 1st. Besides the regular four, James Price made the trip to France with the crew as spare man, but did not do any rowing there.

**IN THE FALL OF 1867.**  
In the fall of 1867, Messrs. Hutton, Fulton, George and James Price rowed the Kennebecasis during the exhibition here. Mr. Ross declined to row in this contest for reasons of his own. The Indian crew, however, consented to have won the race, but came in on the wrong side.

Efforts to have Mr. Ross row again were made and he consented. A meeting was held and the Indian crew were asked to row again. They, however, declined to row the same crew as in the past race on the Kennebecasis. The race was for six miles and after the second mile the Paris crew had the contest much to themselves and finished about a minute and forty seconds in advance of their rivals. This made the Paris crew the undisputed champions of this side of the water.

**RACES ON THE SEINE.**  
In 1869 races were rowed at Lachine, Toronto and old Niagara Town. The Paris crew captured all these events handsomely. In the fall of that year through the instigation of the Lachine Rowing Club a match was arranged between the Paris crew and the English and Taylor crew of England. This took place at Lachine in 1870. After a mile of the race had been completed and the Paris crew in the lead, a cyclone sprang up and the local men's boat went under water. The Englishmen under Renforth had a stronger boat and she withstood the cyclone, winning the race. This was the first event lost by the Paris crew.

St. John challenged again that same fall and Renforth declined to come out with the same crew but stated they would seek another from England. He chose Harry Kelley, James Pierce, Robert Chambers and himself. This race took place on the Kennebecasis in the 22nd of August, 1871. When the two crews had rowed about a mile at a tearing pace, and the Paris crew had a slight advantage, Renforth collapsed. He was taken ashore, but died about an hour afterwards. The Paris crew completed the course. All St. John witnessed the race and there were about 40,000 visitors in the city from all parts of Canada and the United States.

**\$500,000 BET.**  
About \$500,000 was bet alone in this city as to the outcome of the event. Boston and New York financiers were on hand, the former backing the Paris crew, and the New Yorkers the others. No crew disputed the Paris crew's right to the championship of the world in the next few years, none being in the class to compete with them.

In 1874 there was big regatta on the Kennebecasis, "Bob" Fulton rowed in the singles with John Biglan of New York, Alex. Bailey and a sculler from Halifax. Fulton captured the event, although Biglan disputed it. In the four-oared event another five-oared crew named the Austin, rowed from Halifax. Fulton captured the event, although Biglan disputed it.
