Moncton, N. B., July 19.--News of the somewhat sudden death of Edward Duffy, a prominent and well-to-do farmer, of Lower Cloverdale, Albert county, reached this city about one o'clock this morning. Mr. Duffy died of a heart failure while he was out to graze his cattle. He failed to return after quite a lengthy absence, though at the house became alarmed and search was made for him. In a field, not far from the house the searchers were shocked to find Duffy's dead body. He had apparently been stricken down with heart failure. Duffy was well known in the parish of Cloverdale. He was unmarried, and an unmarried sister kept house for him. He was about 65 years of age.
