1,145 MILES IN 24 HOURS

Simplex, Driven by Charles Bode, the Winning Car in Brighton Beach Race, Covered this Distance.

Brighton Beach, N. Y., May 14.—Charles Bode, driving a Simplex car won the 24 hours automobile race of the Motor Racing Association tonight, completing 1145 miles.
