## DANGERS TO NAVIGATION.

New York, Feb. 18—Stmr. Birming-  
 ham (Br.) reports Jan. 28, lat 41 37  
 N, lon 36 40 W, saw a fisherman's  
 dory, Feb. 7, lat 36 56 N, lon 62 20 W,  
 saw two pieces of timber about 20  
 feet long and 2 feet square, covered  
 with barnacles.

Stmr. Cornishman (Br.) reports Feb.  
 9, lat 35 46 N, lon 43 59 W, passed a  
 submerged derelict with a spar pro-  
 jecting about 20 feet out of water.

Stmr. Maria de Larrinaga (Br.) re-  
 ports Jan. 22, lat 40 32 N, lon 25 24  
 W, passed a red iron conical buoy

with ring bolts on sides and very  
 much battered.

Stmr. Volturino (Br.) reports Feb.  
 9, lat 45 35 N, lon 53 42 W, to lat 45  
 29 N, 55 W, saw a log about an  
 inch thick.

Stmr. Trunkby (Br.) reports Feb.  
 6, lat 38 31 N, lon 64 10 W, saw what  
 appeared to be a ship's boiler, at-  
 tached to wreckage and projecting  
 about four feet out of water.

Stmr. Chesapeake reports, Sandy  
 Point, Chesapeake Bay, bearing N  
 by E 1-2 E, about four miles distant,  
 passed a spar about 60 feet long.

## SCHOONER WRECK DESTROYED.

Baltimore, Feb. 18—The wreck of  
 str. City, of Georgetown, which was  
 run down and sunk by the German  
 str. Prinz Oskar, has been destroyed  
 by the revenue cutter Seminole.

## REPORTS OF DISASTERS.

London, Feb. 18—Str. Ovidia (Sw),  
 Norden, for New Orleans, struck on  
 the bar when leaving Puerto Rico and  
 put back leaky; no damage to cargo  
 anticipated.

Str. Craigard from Norfolk for Rot-  
 terdam, reported on her arrival at Rot-  
 terdam today that she had left St.  
 John Point on Feb. 9 in lat 45, lon 36,  
 after a steel hawser with which she  
 had attempted to tow her had parted;  
 the Crown Point had previously been  
 reported spoken in lat 48 21, lon 27 55  
 with loss of rudder.

Ship Roland (Ger) Dieckers, from  
 Jucaro Jan 7, for Amsterdam, was  
 passed in lat 40 40, lon 42 W, with loss  
 of rudder.

Sch. Borealis, Kilnthon, from Muk-  
 liden Dec 5, for Samoa, was wrecked at  
 Tonga, Feb. 10, crew saved; vessel has  
 been sold; hull and materials realized  
 £280.

Mobile, Ala., Feb. 18—Fishing sch.  
 D. Trafton, owned by the Mobile Fish  
 and Oyster Co., and valued at \$40,000,  
 has been wrecked at Grand Isle, Fla.  
 The crew were saved.

Tacoma, Wash., Feb. 17—Sound str.  
 Sioux collided with and cracked stern  
 of str. Admiral Sampson during dense  
 fog this morning; the Sioux was un-  
 damaged.
