

AUSTRIANS SAY ITALIAN LOSSES ABOUT 250,000

Italians and Enemy Engaged In Bitter Fighting On Isonzo

Vienna Claims That Italian Losses in Eleventh Isonzo Battle Have Reached Almost a Quarter of Million, Including Twenty Thousand Prisoners.

Udine, Italy, Sept. 13.—Italians and Austro-Hungarians are engaged in bitter fighting for possession of Monte San Gabriele, on the Isonzo front. A bulletin issued today by General Cadorna mentioning Monte San Gabriele for the first time, reveals that intense fighting for possession of that point has been going on since the taking of Monte Santo by the Italians.

While the top of Monte San Gabriele has not yet been captured, the Italians now are firmly established just under the crest and out of range of the Austrian artillery fire. The Austrian resistance has been of a most desperate character and there have been heavy losses on both sides.

Official Statement.

Rome, Sept. 13.—New Austrian forces yesterday renewed their attempts to dislodge the Italians from the slopes of the height, but after advancing at a few points, they were stopped by the main Italian line of occupation.

"Northeast of Gorizia, the enemy, employing units recently sent to our front, yesterday renewed with great intensity and with a larger number of forces his attempts to dislodge us from Monte San Gabriele. His furious attacks were successful in a few advanced posts, but were stopped by our main line of occupation which was stubbornly defended by the gallant troops of our 11th division, and which could not be shaken or penetrated.

"On the Trentino front, during actions at advanced posts enemy patrols were put to flight.

"An enemy airplane brought down by our anti-aircraft fire, fell in the neighborhood of Dinio."

CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY SUBSIDIZED BY THE COUNTY TO THE EXTENT OF \$3,000

Expenditure for Last Year About \$4,000—Some Cash Donated by Public Spirited Citizens—Board Held Meeting Last Night—Mrs. Milligan's Resignation Accepted—A New Home to Be Secured—Miss Pickett Addressed the Board

Since the matter is causing considerable controversy not only through the columns of the press but among the citizens in general regarding the condition of the interior of the Children's Home on Elliott Road, the facilities for the caring of those admitted, it will be of interest for the public to know the amount of money the home has for its upkeep. In the first place the County grants the home \$3,000 per year. Out of this amount, the Children's Aid Society do not receive any subsidy for the upkeep of that institution.

Berlin, Sept. 13.—German cavalry posts to the south of the Riga-Vernon road, on the northern Russian front, yesterday withdrew before strong Russian pressure, according to the official announcement issued today by the German war office.

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the little children in the home who was ill suffering from gross neglect of the mother was admitted to the Hospital yesterday.

The report of Rev. George Scott agent for the Society was as follows: During the past month five children were placed in the shelter. Two of these were under two years old and one was under twelve months old. Of these five, two are now in the General Public Hospital. The youngest was placed in a temporary home in the North end and it is expected that two more will be taken out this week.

It was found necessary to have two hearings before our commissioners. As a result one child was committed to the care of the Society but it has since been released to the custody of the foster mother. One visit was made to a ward of the society in his foster home in King's County. He has been there for nearly two years now and it is gratifying to know that things are in a very satisfactory state both as regards him and his foster parents.

WANT HYATT TO BE MOTION PICTURE CENSOR

Trades and Labor Council Elect Delegates to Dominion Congress and Censure Commissioner McLellan.

At a special meeting of the Trades and Labor Council, held in the Oddfellows' building last evening, Fred Hyatt, ex-secretary of the Trades and Labor Council, and a member of the Great War Veterans' Association, was endorsed as suitable for the position of motion picture censor which is now open.

Secretary J. L. Searge and Vice-President John Kemp were appointed to represent the council at the Trades and Labor Congress convention which opens at Ottawa the 17th of September. J. E. Tighe, representing the International Longshoremen's Association, and Harry Kemp, representing the Cigar-makers' Union, Local 346, were also elected to go to the convention.

The Council passed a resolution condemning Commissioner McLellan for his attitude in connection with the recent meeting addressed by President Watters.

CIRCUIT COURT.

The case of Harry B. Wetmore vs. The British and Canadian Underwriters of Norwich, England, came up in circuit before His Honor Chief Justice McKeown, yesterday afternoon, but was postponed until Sept. 28, 11 o'clock. In this case the plaintiff claims the sum of \$250 insurance on a house in Glen Falls, burned on April 8, 1916; the defendants refuse to pay. J. E. M. Baxter, K.C., and Francis Kerr for the plaintiff, and A. H. Hamilton, K.C., and M. G. Teed, K.C., for the defendants.

His Honor also heard the return to a writ of habeas corpus issued on his part on Saturday last on the application of Daniel Mullin, K.C., acting for the father, George J. Curry, and returnable before the Chief Justice yesterday at 2.30 p.m., ex parte Susan Isabel Curry, an infant, four years of age. The mother, Annie Curry, daughter of Calvin Marney of Brookville, had the custody of the child, and the court ordered it to be delivered to the father and adjourned until Wednesday next at 11 a.m., in Chambers, if settlement has not been reached in the meantime. The mother was unrepresented by counsel and Vice Chief Justice advised her to retain one if she intended to contest the matter. Prospects for the reconciliation of the husband and wife are good.

"NIGHT SCHOOL" NEW FEATURE AT Y. M. C. A.

One of the new features of the Y. M. C. A. work this year will be a night school for the benefit of boys who had to leave school early in life and it is planned to give them a chance to catch up in some of the subjects they are behind in. The school opens Monday, October 8th, and classes will be held on Monday and Friday evenings throughout the winter. The teaching staff will be composed of A. M. Greig, boys' secretary, and his assistant, Jack Jordan.

FOUR WITNESSES BUT LITTLE EVIDENCE AT WILLIAMS ENQUIRY

Those Who Testified Last Night Threw No Additional Light on Death of North End Grocer.

Four witnesses were examined at last evening's session of the Williams enquiry at the court house, Coroner F. L. Kenney presiding. The testimony last evening was not in itself of an important character, but it may possibly be connected up at the next hearing with circumstances that will throw additional light on the tragedy. The session occupied about an hour and the inquest was then adjourned until Thursday evening next, September 20th.

Francis Kerr represented the family of the deceased.

Miss Florence K. Morrissey of 175 Alcotale street, was the first witness examined. She testified that a day or two after the death of Mr. Williams she had been informed by Mrs. Frank Watson that Miss Lingley had been in the store of the deceased about 11 o'clock on the evening that he met his death. Mrs. Watson had informed the witness that she had met Miss Lingley and the latter had told her that she bought a box of berries at the store the evening of the tragedy.

Fred H. McTulkin gave evidence of having been informed that Miss Lingley was in the store about 11 o'clock on the evening of the death of the deceased. Witness met Miss Lingley shortly afterwards and she said she was not in the store that evening, but the occasion was not a measure of precaution.

William J. McGuire, recalled, said that he borrowed the window brush from the deceased about 11 o'clock p.m. That was the last occasion he had seen Mr. Williams alive. Witness saw Stanley Hawkhurst enter the store. Some people passed the store while witness was washing the window.

Stanley Hawkhurst, former clerk in the Williams store, said that the deceased did not deliver any of the parcels. Witness had driven Miss Lingley to Chesley street on two occasions when the deceased granted permission at her request to be in the store. The deceased seemed to be in his usual good spirits and was not at all depressed.

Coroner Kenney announced that he hoped to complete the evidence at last session. The coroner was then adjourned until Thursday, September 20th.

Petrograd, Sept. 13.—Regarding the monarchist conspiracy, the procurator of the Moscow high court declares that the chief conspirator was Mme. Hiron, wife of the former director of posts, who was engaged in a plot to release the former Emperor Nicholas.

Some of the Petrograd papers assert that Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovich, brother of Nicholas, and Grand Duke Paul were not implicated in the plot, but were arrested as a measure of precaution.
