Fredericton, July 30—As Judge Gregory intends to leave on a vacation trip to the old country there will be no October term of the division court here.

Fredericton, N. B., July 31—The auction sale of horses imported by the New Brunswick government took place here this afternoon and was fairly successful.

Although the weather was unsettled about 200 people attended the river counties being well represented.

The highest price obtained for a mare was \$335 for a three year old Clydesdale mare, and a two year old of the same breed sold for \$185, which was the lowest figure obtained.

The three year old Clydesdale stallion Royal Provost was purchased by J. F. Tweedale for the Perth and Kinross Agricultural Society for \$600 and the four year old French coach mare was knocked down to J. F. Vanbuskirk, of this city, for \$500.

THE WANDRAIN INQUIRY

Two Sessions Held at Customs House Thursday—Evidence of Captain and Mate is Contradictory.

An inquiry was started Thursday with reference to the stranding of the schooner Wandrain at Little River (Me.) on December 27 last.

The Wandrain remained in Little River until the 27th, the captain not deeming it safe to go out.

The witness stated that on trying to lower the starboard anchor the ship was struck on the port anchor by the windmill.

The inquiry was continued on Monday and Tuesday, when evidence was given by other witnesses.

Mr. McKewen, who was acting as mate of the Wandrain at the time of the disaster, testified that he did not have mate's certificate.

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MOROCCO SITUATION HAS GROWN SERIOUS

Europeans Killed and Powers Are Taking a Hand

Tanger, Aug. 1—Dr. Morall, who arrived here last night on a German steamer which brought a number of Jews and refugees from Casablanca, is the bearer of a report to the French charge d'affaires here, showing that the slaughter of Europeans in Casablanca was the outcome of a policy of war preached by the Arabs for the extermination of Europeans.

On Monday a number of Arab chieftains, Casablanca, were in the harbor improvement works case. The Paiba of Casablanca pointed out that the work was being done with the sanction of the Sultan, who has a German doctor at his disposal.

Mr. Douville, the French consul, demanded that the Paiba provide an escort for the recovery of the bodies. The Paiba pleaded that he had no cartridges, but upon further representations he finally supplied an escort.

It is believed that a lack of ammunition by the disaffected soldiers, coupled with the strictest surveillance on the part of the Japanese authorities, will prevent risings in the west.
