Canada has millions of acres yet touched. Reciprocity will develop them.

If there are still people who cannot understand how the producer and consumer can both benefit by the removal of the tax, here is an illustration

that will help. Smith has a house to sell, for which he wants \$4,000, and no less. Jones is willing to pay \$4,000 and no more.

If no agent demands a com-mission, they can close up the deal. But if \$50 has to be paid to a real estate agent, that \$50 must be made up by the parties, or one loses a sale and the other a chance to buy the house he wants

If they go on with the deal they must split the difference. Jones will pay \$4,025, Smith will net \$3,975. Each will lose \$25 in order that the agent may have his \$50.

This is exactly what happens in the sale of Canadian food in the United States. On a sale of \$100 each Government collects 25 or more. The buyer and seller must make up this \$25 between them. When the Gov-ernment takes the tax off, it presents the parties with the \$25. The case is exactly as if the real estate agent should give up his commission. He would benefit both parties.

But there is more than this. The buyer and seller of food are now taxed not only by the two Governments but by middlemen, whose profits are made by buying cheap from the farm-er and selling dear to the

housewife.
