A Lynching Case. Further particulars relating to the recent lynching of the old man Kessler in Fulton, Mo., on Friday make up a shockthat Kessler and his son were arrested some time since, and sent to jail in Jefferson City to await trial on the charge of stealing a lot of mules from a number of farmers in the vicinity. On Friday mornfarmers in the vicinity. On Friday morning they were taken from their cells by the sheriff, and while en route for Fulton young Kessler managed to slip his handcuffs, jump from the train and escape. When the train arrived at Fulton an immense throng of citizens had collected about the station, and their indignation was intense when they learned that one of the prigrapers had escaped. The aged of the prisoners had escaped. The aged prisoner was taken to the Court House, prisoner was taken to the Court House, where, having no counsel nor money, he pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to the penitentiary for six mouths. Just as the driver was about to mount, however, a man stepped up with a drawn revolver and bade him carried aside, and taking the reins and stand aside, and taking the reins and jumping on the seat, started up the street on a run. He turned and pointed his revolver at Kessler, but was prevented from firing by the sheriff. Just at this

point about twenty-five men mounted their horses and went in pursuit of the carriage and connenced firing into it. The sheriff was shot in the spine and can-not live, while one of the constables and the attorney were seriously wounded. The mob then got possession of the carriage and drove to a grove about a mile from the Court House, and there hung Kessler. He made no statements, but of fered up a very earnest prayer, after which he was strung up and left dead.
