**Mr. Nielsen:** Madam Speaker, we are seeing an attempt at grandstanding, which is quite outside of the Standing Orders.

**Some hon. Members:** Oh, oh!

**Mr. Nielsen:** They laugh over there at the right of the opposition to question supply by this process, the only process available to us. Standing Order 58(10) requires the Chair to put every question necessary to dispose of these proceedings forthwith successively without debate or amendment. That is what we should be doing without entertaining grandstanding points of order, propositions and negotiating on the floor of the House. These are the proceedings of supply. It is our last opportunity to oppose estimates.
