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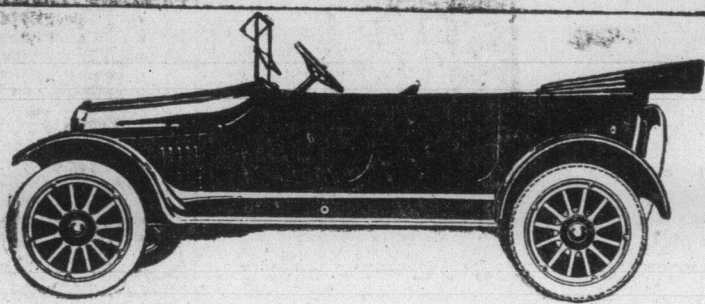

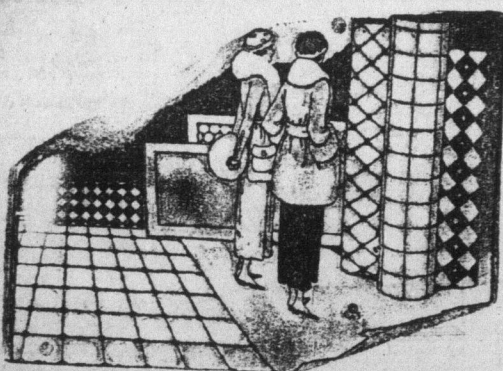

Preliminary Terms of Peace Being Drawn

Discussion of Disposition of Enemy Naval Vessels

BLOCKADE IS TO BE MODIFIED

PARIS, Mar. 3. (By Fred Ferguson).—The Supreme War Council to-day takes up the terms of preliminary peace to be imposed on Germany. At the same time it discusses the conditions under which the economic blockade of that country will be partially raised.

The conditions under which blockade is to be modified will be understood, be ready to put effect immediately after the return to Paris of President Wilson, Lloyd George and Premier Clemenceau.

The separate peace terms will be completed by the first of next month; after which the details of the peace will be discussed. Turkey will be discussed. The terms and naval terms will be discussed in the preliminary peace report, submitted Saturday, was to include destruction of all enemy material, with the exception of arms for a few divisions, which will be left for police duty.

The will also be given supervision all German factories. The naval conditions were said to include surrender to the allies of practically all remains of the German navy.

units to be turned over will be battleships: Oldenburg, Thüringen, Ostfriesland, Helgoland, Posen, Walen, Rheinland and Nassau; light cruisers, Pillau, Graudenz, ensburg, Stralsund, Strassburg, burg, Kiburg and Stuttgart; modern destroyers and fifty more torpedo boats.

Warship under construction will be broken up. All German submarine docks and the famous tubular-dock must be surrendered or destroyed within two weeks the treaty is signed. Similar work the process of construction must be broken up within three months.

peace is concluded, though the materials may be used for peaceful purposes. German naval craft, already in allied harbors, will be formally seized. They may be destroyed though French objection may be in a modification of this plan.

The fortifications of Helgoland will be razed and the Kiel canal be opened to vessels of all nations. Merchant cruisers and auxiliary vessels can easily be converted into merchantmen, will be treated as such. German cables will not be returned and men wireless will be limited to commercial uses.

When peace is concluded with tria, her fleet of thirteen battleships, two cruisers, ten light cruisers, destroyers, 51 torpedo boats, 33 submarines and 12 Danube monitors will be handed over. The Turkish and Bulgarian navies will like be seized.

In an interview with correspondents yesterday, Foreign Minister Pichon said that no official information had been received regarding

the situation in the Balkans.

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
