#### **UNB: \$3.5 mil in NSERC grants**

The Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada has awarded \$3,596,538 to UNB researchers in support of new and continued research, and for the purchase of related equipment for the 1996-97 academic year. Additional funding from other NSERC programs such as industrial research chairs and research partnerships will increase the total NSERC support for 1996-97 to over \$4 million.

"The University of New Brunswick enjoys a significant record of success in the attainment of external research support," said Frank Wilson, UNB's Vice President of research and international cooperation. "I'm pleased with the results of our NSERC applications, particularly the success rate of our new applicants."

## **Benfey named to Committee**

A biology professor at UNB has been named to Canada's National Biotechnology Advisory Committee.

Tillman Benfey, a specialist in fish physiology and aquaculture, was appointed to the position by John Manley, Minister of Industry Canada.

Established in 1983, the National Biotechnology Advisory Committee comprises senior representatives from Canada's business, academic, financial, communications, and legal communities. Its members provide advice to the minister of industry on matters related to the development and commercialization of biotechnology in Canada.

"I feel honored to be included in such a high-level committee of business executives and university administrators," Dr. Benfey said. "I am excited by the opportunity this appointment provides for input at the national level in biotechnology.

"Salmon farming is a major industry in the province: it's our most valuable agricultural product," he said. "New Brunswick and UNB can benefit from having a representative advise the federal government on development of the industry."

Of the 15 committee members, Dr. Benfey appears to be the one with major expertise in aquaculture. "Among farmed animals, biotechnology is most likely to have a major impact in fish, as they are more amenable to biotechnology than other animals, such as cows or pigs," he observed. "I hope to be able to brief the committee and minister on the importance of aquaculture biotechnology and where the impediments to development lie."

**SU Council delays budget**

The UNB Student Union decided to postpone the first readings of its 1996-97 budget until April 2. This will force the second reading, at which the budget will be debated, to take place on April 9. An emergency meeting of Council was called to accept the final version of the budget. The Council Chair has set this meeting for April 11.

The delay was the result of efforts to force compliance with the Student Union Financial Policy, which states that the Finance Committee must meet and consider the budget, and then present the budget to Council.

"It's true," acting vice-president Duncan Fulton told Council. "If you look at the Bylaws - we didn't follow them."

"It just wasn't logistically possible to have a meeting," he continued.

Derek Ferlatte, member of the Finance Committee, complained that the Finance Committee was circumvented. "This budget," he said, pointing at the

work of only two people - that's not the

Duncan Fulton acknowledged that this was true, but that the budget consultations which were held for clubs and societies on Saturday, March 23 had only two members of the committee in attendance. Ferlatte confirmed that this had been the case, but stated "The committee knew that this would be the case. It did not, however, authorize Mr. Fulton and Mr. Chiasson to put the budget together alone."

"I understand entirely," he later told The Brunswickan. "The fact is that it's supposed to go to the Finance Committee, and it didn't. It was perfectly reasonable

While the preliminary budget distributed to Council was collected by Fulton, The Brunswickan has learned a few details about the 1996-97 proposal. The new student fee would stand at \$106 for next year, if the proposal was accepted. This would mean an increase of \$4 per student. This would result in an increase to the Student Union operating budget of roughly \$28,000.

Other details surfacing: Councilors honouraria was reinstated (after a lack thereof for the past three years), and the part-time receptionist is set to become fulltime in September of 1996.

making them pay a fee." At the March 21 meeting of the STU Student Union Council, STU Vice-President (Administration) Shawn Rouse reported that the SUBS Board may review the free associate membership currently enjoyed by STU students, in the wake of the "NO" vote on SUB expansion.

Bertrand was furious that such claims have been made. "Whoever told Mr. Rouse this was the case was completely out of line. They had absolutely no authority to make that claim on behalf of the Board. At this point, such a decision is entirely political," she says. "None of the decisions about the Cellar and Bar Services should be influenced, in any way, by the political whims of the [UNB] Student Union Executive or the [UNB Student Union] Council.'

UNB SU Vice-President (Student Services) Trish Davidson makes the distinction that while it would be "a politically good idea," it would not be a "good business idea." She argues in favour of a fee, however, "Why should they [STU students] drink at subsidized prices for free?"

Rouse maintains that members of the UNB SU Executive indicated that such a move was being pursued by the Council and the SUBS Board. SU President Kelly Lamrock clarified that Council would not "decide from on high" regarding any fee proposal. "We're not going out of our way to exclude St. Thomas from anything. All I'm proposing is a review."
