

- A Not at present - I am thinking of their future.
- Q Do the Indians use that now every year for fishing?
- A Yes, I think so.
- Q If they were cut off from the use of that now would they suffer a hardship?
- A Hardship - that is a hard word to use.
- Q What word would you use?
- A I would use the words "less comfortably".
- Q It would impair their material conditions considerably?
- A Yes, although that is a hard word "material".
- Q Would it in a definite measure impair their material condition?
- A Yes, in a definite measure.
- Q And you identify the point marked on the map No. 10?
- A Yes.
- Q It is important as a fishing station?
- A Yes, mainly. *as such*
- Q And is it used also as a hunting base?
- A Yes.
- Q What is the smallest quantity of land that would secure the Indians a piece of land there?
- A I should say five acres.
- Q Would it not be less than five acres - they only have one shack there; the occupation of any more land than gives them a landing place and the place where their shack is, with a bit of ground around it, would appear to me to be not of much benefit to them?
- A I would then say one acre.
- Q Now Application No. 11 - are you sure this is the same place that is referred to in the tabulation?
- A Yes.
- Q Did you visit that point?
- A Yes.
- Q What did you find there?
- A (Reading from Note Book): One shack built of split cedar; one stream with a waterfall - no fish. There is a large stream on the left in which there are cohoes and dog salmon - clay soil - took four pictures.
