## CHAPTER V

EDUCATIONAL WORK IN NOVA SCOTIA

ABOUT the year 1849, an effort was made to infuse new life into Dalhousie College, an institution which had received a small provincial endowment, and possessed a building in the city of Halifax. Dr. McCulloch had been transferred some years before, from his position in Pictou, to be its principal; but on his death it threatened to lapse into a decaying state. In these circumstances it was suggested that, for one year, a series of extra-academical lectures on scientific and other subjects should be delivered, to which the public might be admitted - a sort of anticipation of the "university extension" movement of our time. An invitation was given to me to take one of these courses,on natural history subjects.
