Canadian Supreme Court Fails Them in Appeal.

Noted Georgia Embezklers Must Be Handed Over to United States-After Three Years' Litigation, Through All Sorts of Courts, They Must Stand Trial-Details of Cause Celebre in Canadian Courts.

Celebre in Canadian Courts.

Ottawa, June 28.—The Supreme Court yesterday morning quashed the appeal of Gaynor and Greene from the court below, and by a unanimous opinion the Court holds the two Americans are subject to extradition and should be handed over to the United States sulfarities.

This is understood to finally dispose of a case, which will be historic in Canadian legal history. Gaynor and Greene had been in the employment of the Government of the United States and were charged with embessionent in connection with certain transactions in the State of Georgia. They eccaped to Canada in 1992, and an application for their axtradition was plication for their extradition was

pilostion for their extradition was made by the United State authorities to the extradition commissioner, Ulric Eartontaine:

Lafontaine:

Lafontaine issued fils warrant for arrest, and Gaynor and Greene applied to: Justice Andrews for a writ of labels's corpus. When the facts were made known to Justice Andrews he comanded them to their lawful custody in Mentreal, whence he thought they never should have been removed. Gaynor and Greene then applied to Justice Caron, who Issued a writ of habeas corpus returnable before himself and ultimately discharged the accused. An appeal was then taken by the United States Government to the judical commistee of the Privy Council, who, on February 8 last, advised His Majesty to reverse the two judgments of Justice Caron on August 13, 1902.

Proceedings before Commissioner Lafontaine were then renewed, and after evidence had been heard he ordered the extradition of the successed. An appeal was intunated for them to the Supreme

An appeal was intimated for them to the Supreme Court, but the United States Government entered a motion to quash the appeal on the ground that it was against good faith, and as it arose out of a criminal charge was incompetent. That motion has been granted, and as the judgment is understood to be final Gaynor and Greene will now be returned to Georgia for trial on the charge of embezzlement originally laid against them.

#### RAILWAY COMMISSION.

In Duthie ve. G. T. R. Chairman Kil-lam Doubts Commission's Ability.

Ottawa June 25.—The complaint of J. H. Duthie of Toronto, on behalf of Hoffman & Co. of Detroit against the Grand Trunk Rhiway Co., on account of demurage charges, was heard by the Railway Commission yesterday morning.

"We may be able to make an order of some kind, but I doubt our ability to adjudicate in money matters," said the chairman.

Judgment on special complaint was reserved, and Duthie then made the argument that the car service, or demurage, charges collected by the Grand Trunk were unjustifiable, and in the nature of extortion. He said the Car Service Association was a combination in restraint of trade. It owed its existence to the fact that the agents of the railway companies were unable to ceilect unreasonable charges.

In reply to Mr. Duthie, M. K. Cowan, for the Grand Trunk, said that the whole matter of the car service was a subject of discussion at present between the Manufacturers' Association and the railway companies, and they keped within the month to arrive at an annocable arrangement.
