TEMPERANCE ON THE BATTLE FIELD.

The following extract is from a letter written by Corporal Hutchinson, of the 13th Regiment, forming part of Colonel Wood's column in Zululand :-

"It may please you to hear that such a thing as intoxicating drink is out of BEECH STREET, 3.50 the Question hear. Our commander does not allow a drop of drink to be brought into camp. He is awfully against men having drink in the field but as for rations he is very good. He believes in giving the men any a. mount to eat but no drink. No matter hor wet you may get on duty it is all the

Very often we are out all night in the rain on duty, having no tents. However, he does not care for that. When we come up wet and cold we get some coffee and a quarter of a pound of bread. Every night there are about 400 men onduty. A civilian brought some waggons into camp, and he had some liquor, which he sold to the men. Some of the men got drunk, and were put in the guard tent, and the next day three of them got flogged. The civlian was sent for, tied up to a waggon, and got thirty-six lashes. He was then sent away from the camp"


