Surveys for the New-Brunswick Land Company, and Stationary, Fuel, &c. for the Grown Land Office. These accounts are now under and, and, consequently, no Warrants have yet issued therefor; to meet these, however, additional nems of Revenue to an amount of upwards of £1,400, strictly accountable within the year were paid over to the Receiver General, shortly after the S1st December, and will appear in the account of the current year.

From the way in which this account is made up, it is impossible for your Committee to ascertain whether it be a correct one or not, as it is unaccompanied by any detail of receipts, either with regard to the quantity of Timber, for which licences have been issued, the number of acres of Land sold, the quantity on which the Quit Rents have been paid, or any other particulars, indispensably necessary to enable them to make a proper report.

Indeed, with the exception of obtaining information as to the way in which the large amount drawn has been applied in 1832, your Committee are of opinion that the House will be in as much obscurity as ever, with regard to the Revenue, after this re-

port is submitted.

Your Committee cannot avoid calling the attention of the House to the tremendous expenses attendant upon the Crown Land Department, the enormous Salary of the Commissioner, and the large amount swallowed up in the collection and protection of this Revenue; and they are satisfied, that, under proper management, an immense saving could be effected. They also call the attention of the House to the sum alleged to have been expended on the Royal Road, and, from the best information they can obtain, it is completed for only about 5 miles.
