Old Age Pensioner Drowned.
"Found Drowned" was the verdict of a coroner's jury at Jarrow relating to the death of John Casson, aged seventy-four, whose body was found in Jarrow Slake. Mrs. Elizabeth Casson, the widow, who resides in Primrose Street, South Hylton, said her husband was an old age pensioner, and for two years they had lived apart, he residing with his stepson in Oak Street, Jarrow. Sergeant Richardson, who described the finding of the body said that Casson's overcoat was neatly folded and laid on the embankment, with his cap on top of it. In his pockets were found his old age pension book, a shilling, and a pipe and tobacco.

The Late Mrs. Thomas.

There was a large attendance at the funeral of the late Mrs. T. H. Thomas, which took place Saturday afternoon from her late residence, 96 Wellington St., to Greenwood cemetery. Many of those who attended were old friends of the deceased. Rev. G. A. Woodside, pastor of the deceased, conducted impressive services at the house and grave. While speaking at the house, Rev. Woodside made mention of the fact that the late Mrs. Thomas was at ways cheerful and had a pleasant word and smile for all. The pall-bearers were Messrs Robert L. Foulds, J. E. Waterous, George Abernethy, T. R. Logan, Richard Bean and Alderman John H. Spence.

The late Mrs. Thomas was in her 73rd year and came to this city in 1852 from Herwickshire, Scotland, and has resided in this city ever since. Deceased was a member of Zion Presbyterian church, and was an active worker until some seven years ago, when owing to health she was compelled to give up much of her church work. She had been a sufferer from paralysis for many years. For the past five years she had been an invalid. During her long illness the late Mrs. Thomas had been a patient sufferer—was always cheerful and glad to have her many friends visit her.

She leaves to mourn her loss, besides a sorrowing husband, one daughter, Miss Isobel, at home, and one son, David C., of New York City, and two brothers, Mr. David Webster, of the Waterworks department in this city, and Mr. Alexander Webster of London, and a host of friends, who will share with the family in their great loss. The late R. H. Thomas, New York city, was also a son.

Terrible Salisbury Tragedy.
Frederick Charles Jefferies, bookseller and stationer, was committed for trial at Salisbury charged with the wilful murder of his daughter, Dorothy, in Castle Street. The man gave himself up at Salisbury Police Station, saying that he had murdered the girl with a razor, and the child was found on a bed in his house with her throat cut. Several witnesses were called by the defence to speak of the depressed state of the accused prior to the tragedy. He appeared to be suffering from a delusion that he had injured himself whilst on a cycling expedition.

In a letter to his wife the prisoner wrote: "Cannot call you wife, as I am not worthy the name of husband. What made me do such an awful thing to dear little Dollie, whom I loved best of all? It was an awful sudden impulse, and I have brought ruin and disgrace amongst you all. Forgive me if you can. I am doomed and shall go to hell, and it serves me right. Kiss the children for me."
