

GERMAN CONSPIRATORS ARRAIGNED; WASHINGTON NOT TO INTERVENE

Three Men Brought up in Police Court, Discharged and Re-arrested by Federal Agents—Washington Doubtful if Case Can be Made Out.

Washington, Oct. 26.—Officials of the department of justice expressed doubt to-day whether the federal government can make out a case against the men implicated in the plot to blow up munitions ships sailing from the United States. Information as to how evidence has been collected by the New York police or the secret service was still lacking to-day and the department will not reach a decision on the matter until all data has been examined. The bureau of investigation of the Justice Department has been interested in the case only indirectly, but Chief A. B. Bielski said to-day that he does not expect to take any active part in the present investigation.

ARRAIGNED IN COURT. New York, Oct. 26.—Robert Fay, a lieutenant in the German army, Walter L. Scholz and Paul Daech, were arraigned to-day on charges in connection with an alleged plot to blow up steamships sailing from New York with munitions for the allies. The three men were discharged by the court but were immediately re-arrested by federal agents on charges of conspiracy sworn to by Chief Flynn of the secret service. Fay, Scholz and Daech left for New York in the afternoon of Oct. 25. They will be arraigned later before United States Commissioner Houghton on the complaint sworn to yesterday by Chief Flynn. The complaint charges the three in connection with Dr. Herbert Kienzel, held in \$25,000 bail yesterday and Max Breitung, still at liberty, conspired to commit an offence against the United States. With four men already under arrest in the alleged conspiracy of German agents to blow up war munitions ships sailing from American ports, federal secret service agents to-day searched for a fifth man, Max Breitung, who was described as secretary and treasurer of the Oil Well Supply Company of this city. It was charged in the complaint with a United States Commissioner by William J. Flynn, chief of the secret service, that Breitung had taken part with others in a conspiracy to despoil the owners of a vessel of money, goods or merchandise on board. It was specifically set forth that Breitung paid for a quantity of chlorate of potash found by detectives who raided the rooms of the other alleged conspirators in Weehawken and Hoboken, N. J.

PREMIER OF CANADA SAVED WOMAN'S LIFE

Snatched Her From Under a Moving Train, Where She Had Fallen.

Moncton, N.S., Oct. 26.—Premier Borden saved the life of a woman who had fallen on the railway track here yesterday afternoon. Sir Robert, who was on his way from his home at Grand Pre, N.S., to Montreal, was standing on the platform when the woman was thrust on the rails by a crowd which congregated at the depot to see him. The woman was rolling under a moving train when the premier immediately caught her and put her in a place of safety.

TO COMMAND FRENCH TROOPS IN SERBIA



General Maurice Sarrail, who commanded the French army of the Orient at the Dardanelles, is to command the expeditionary army landed at Salonica for service in Serbia. General Sarrail, who was taken from the command of the troops in the Argonne, where he had held the lines before Verdun against Crown Prince's army, succeeded General H. J. E. Gouraud at the Dardanelles last summer after General Gouraud had been incapacitated by severe wounds, one of which caused the loss of an arm. General A. P. Hamilton commands the British wing of the expedition.

SOLICITOR'S LETTERS TO COUNCIL

Approval of This Marks What Aldermen Did in Gas Co.'s Application.

The action of the council last night over the application of the Gas Co. to use Tilbury gas can best be explained by saying that it approved the recommendations and suggestions contained in the letter from the city solicitor and ordered him to notify the gas company to that effect. The following is the letter: The Mayor and Council of the City of Brantford, Ont.: Gentlemen—Application has been made by the Brantford Gas Company Limited for permission to lay a line of pipe to connect with the Tilbury city and to run by Stanley and Northumberland streets in to the works of the company, the purpose being to transmit Tilbury gas through this line into the works, to purify it there, and then to distribute it by way of additional supply of Haldimand and Onondaga gas of which the Company states there will be a shortage this winter. I am informed that the company is willing that a condition should be attached that it shall cut off this auxiliary supply on a day's notice if the municipal authorities order it at any time. The application of the company has been referred to me for advice and proper safeguards, I would recommend that the application be granted. In connection with the above I have been informed that manufacturing establishments in Brantford which are using natural gas for manufacturing purposes, some of them being entirely dependent upon it under the present organization of their plants, have been notified that the company will be unable to take care of their requirements after November 1st. I have made some inquiries and have ascertained that it is quite feasible with the permission of the Corporation for the Brantford Gas Company to lay an independent line without interfering with any of the streets which are paved so as to reach these manufacturing establishments and additional ones—estimated at a capital outlay for pipe line and installation of same of a very moderate sum. I have brought this to the attention of the legal adviser of the company. I think it advisable that the municipal authorities of the City of Brantford should make it perfectly clear that although we will not permit the distribution of Tilbury gas unpurified for domestic purposes we are willing to permit its distribution for manufacturing purposes, and I, therefore, recommend that the attitude of the council in regard to this matter should be made known to the Gas Company. CAPITAL OF TURKEY GOAL FOR RACE

Not Known Yet Whether Allies Will be Strong Soon Enough to Stop Drive.

By Special Wire to the Courier. London, Oct. 26.—The race for the road to Constantinople has reached an exciting stage. The Bulgarians are within a few miles of forming a junction with their Austro-German allies, while the French, in small force, already have joined the Serbians. The French are not yet in sufficient numbers to assume an actual offensive in Macedonia, but the rapidity of the Bulgarian advance in that region already has diminished. Along the old Bulgarian frontier, from a point north-east of Vranja to the Rumanian border, the Serbians are yielding little ground. An actual junction between the Bulgarians and their allies, which may be a matter of only a few hours, will soon show whether the Serbians are able to hold their mountain positions until the entente allies bring up strong forces. Italy is still hammering away at the Austrian front which is shaken but not unbroken. It is expected in London that the Italian offensive will at least prevent the Austrians from reinforcing their Balkan army. Russia, by her stubborn defence of Riga and Dvinsk, and her continued offensive in Galicia, is keeping her opponents engaged busily, an Italian whole eastern front. In the west there is evidence that the entente allies are again preparing for an offensive, which may prevent the Germans from diverting any of their forces there.

Britain, Italy and Russia Giving Troops to Serbia

Bulgaria Holds Fifty Miles of Railway Between Nish and Saloniki, But Serbs Still Fighting Stubbornly—Bulgars Are Really Slavs.

Saloniki, via Paris, Oct. 26.—A brigade of British troops will leave Saloniki to-morrow (Tuesday) for Doina (forty miles northwest of Saloniki). The object of this move, so it is stated, is to prepare an advance on Strumitza in conjunction with the French movement by way of the Sava valley when the next offensive against Bulgaria is undertaken.

ITALY ALLOP. London, Oct. 26.—Reuter's Malta correspondent reports that more Italian classes are being summoned to the colors to enable Italy to co-operate with the allies in the east as soon as possible.

AND RUSSIA. Paris, Oct. 26.—Russia has completed preparations for the despatch of strong forces of troops to help the Serbs at points where they are most needed, according to the Petit Parisien.

MORE CONQUESTS. Sofia, via London, Oct. 25.—The Bulgarian War Office issues the following statement relative to military operations on October 24: "Our troops have captured Negotin and Prahovo. The booty so far as is known is one company of cartridges and war material. We captured also one officer, 270 men and found on the battlefield the bodies of 300 Serbs. "Prince Cyrille and the commander of the army were solemnly received at Uskub."

The last statement from Sofia before this said that the Bulgarians had captured the greater part of Uskub in Macedonia, but that the fighting there was still in progress on October 23. Prince Cyrille is the second son of King Ferdinand of Bulgaria.

HOLD RAILROAD STRONGLY. Saloniki, via Paris, Oct. 26.—With Uskup in their possession, the Bulgarians now hold with strong forces the Nish-Saloniki railroad between Vranja and Uskup, a distance of about 100 miles. They have thus cut direct communication between Nish and Saloniki, leaving open only the indirect means of transit over the Monastir-Pristina line.

"The situation in Serbia is grave, of course, but it is in no wise desperate," said a French official this evening. "The Austrians and Germans have advanced less than 12 miles on the Danube front, notwithstanding their numerical superiority. "The line now held by the Bulgarians may prove to be perilous to them. You may say the French are fully alive to the situation and are not at all discouraged."

CANADIAN OFFICIAL REPORT

Corp. Babcock and Pte. Berry Cut Through Wire and Work Way to Parapat.

Ottawa, Oct. 26.—The Minister of Militia this afternoon gave out the following official communication just received at the department from the Canadian general representative at the front:

"There has been no material change in the general situation during the period from October 15 to 22nd. For the first half of the period, fog prevailed and the enemy's artillery was unusually quiet. During the latter half the weather cleared and the enemy's artillery displayed considerable activity.

About fifteen hundred shells were fired in our area. Our artillery replied with good effect against the enemy lines. The enemy has been daily engaged repairing the damage to his parapets and trenches caused by our bombardment of Oct. 13th, and on several occasions at the commencement of the period, his work parties were dispersed by our fire.

The enemy has displayed no enterprise in patrolling. Our patrols have been very active, and on the afternoon of October 17th a patrol of our fifth battalion found the body of a German in an enemy sap opposite our trenches. On the night of the 18th a patrol of our Seventh Battalion, consisting of Lieut. Owen Sergis, Ashby and Mergenstein, Corp. Babcock and Private Berry cut through German wire and worked its way up to the enemy's parapet until it was able to locate the enemy machine gun emplacement and two trench mortars, which had been causing considerable damage to our front line. These localities were successfully bombed by us on October 20, and Lieuts. Allen and McLaren of our 16th battalion, carried out a reconnaissance of a house close to the enemy's lines. This house was found to have been fortified by the enemy.

"On the night of October 21st this house was blown up by our engineers under the direction of Lieut. Cosgrave.

"Lieut. McLaren of the 16th battalion, and Lieut. Price of the 13th battalion, covered the operation with a party of bombers and riflemen of the 13th battalion. No casualties were suffered.

"In a special reconnaissance of the ground, conducted by Lieut. Sutherland and Private Mellard of the 13th battalion, much useful information was gained. On October 22nd, we exploded a mine on our front with good effect.

"A technical school for instruction in various trench warfare appliances has been started by our brigade. Grenade schools are working well throughout.

"Our 42nd and 4th battalions were in the trenches during the period. Much work has been performed throughout our line in improvement and draining of trenches. At several points our line has been straightened. "The health of the troops continues excellent.

Spy Executed. London, Oct. 26.—The following official announcement of a military execution was issued to-day: "A prisoner of espionage was found guilty and sentenced to death by being shot. The prisoner appealed and his appeal was dismissed on October 18th. The sentence was carried out by the military authorities this morning."

ITALIANS REPULSED

Austrian Official Report Says So—Also an Air Raid on Trieste.

Vienna, via London, Oct. 26.—The following official statement was given out by the Austrian war office to-night:

"Russian theatre: Attacks west of Izattorsk are proceeding favorably. In spite of severe resistance the enemy has been pressed back towards the Syrr. Yesterday's results include two officers and one thousand men made prisoners and four machine guns captured. In the northeast there is nothing else to report.

"Italian theatre: The battle of the Isongo is proceeding. Yesterday, the 14th day, was characterized by great infantry combats. We repulsed all the Italian attacks with severe losses and wherever maintained our positions. On the Tyrolean front several battalions unsuccessfully attacked our lines of defense on the plateau of Villgerath. The enemy's attacks against Gima di Mezoldi and the village of Sief and in the uppermost Rienz valley failed also.

"Attacks on the Krn yesterday and last night were repulsed. Two attacks against Mrzilivrh were repulsed. The heaviest losses suffered by the Italians. Southeast of this mountain the enemy penetrated one of our trenches for a short distance, but were ejected by counter-attacks. A new attack by two battalions of Alpine troops collapsed before our fire, the enemy's forces being almost annihilated. Before the bridgehead of Kolmino an attack was directed against our positions on the ridge west of Santa Lucia and near Sief, which remained in our position. The Plava district has been under heavy artillery fire. Concentrations of the enemy's troops near Plava were dispersed by our artillery. Near Zagora in the course of the day, the Italians captured a projecting portion of our trenches, but were ejected during the night. Before Monte Zabon yesterday forenoon another attack failed before our artillery fire. Later the enemy abandoned an attempt to approach our positions at the Gorizia bridgehead.

"The severest fighting occurred in the northern sector of the Doberdo plateau where the strongest Italian forces repeatedly attacked in masses. Received by a destructive fire the enemy was obliged to retreat under cover. An attack against our position east of Nonfalcone had a similar result, as did all other efforts of the Italians.

"Triest yesterday was visited by the enemy's airmen. Two inhabitants were killed and twelve wounded by bombs.

BOUND TO THE KAISER

King Constantine of Greece Has Secret Treaty With Germany.

New York, Oct. 26.—A London cable to The Herald says:

"Dr. E. J. Dillon telegraphs from Rome to The Daily Telegraph that he knows for an absolute fact that while the Greek cabinet is under no treaty obligations to the Central Empires, King Constantine is bound to the Kaiser by a solemn pledge to maintain neutrality toward Germany, the Kaiser agreeing to give to Greece territorial compensations after the war if she does not cast her lot with the allies.

"To do him justice," says Dr. Dillon, "King Constantine, it must be said, refused, despite threats to draw the sword on the side of Germany." "Dr. Dillon is convinced that if the allies send a big army to save Serbia, Rumania, who also has been promised compensation by the Kaiser for her neutrality, will support the quadruple entente, but if the support of Greece is needed the entente will have to use their navy to overcome the scruples of Greece pro-Germanism.

The only effect Great Britain's offer of Cyprus has been to make King Constantine through Mr. Zaimis, the Premier, ask for more, says Mr. Dillon. "But if the allies send big armies to Serbia, the German conspiracy will fall and both Greece and Rumania will support the Entente, but the relieving force must be a big, a very big army."

DIFFERS ABOUT MUSSULMEN. Paris, Oct. 26.—Eleutherios Venizelos, former prime minister of Greece, has refused to support the government in the chamber of deputies on the question of the retrocession of the Mussulman property in Macedonia, according to information received here from Athens. "These despatches, sent on Monday say that the sitting of the Greek chamber was suspended and that it was reported in the lobby that when the sitting resumed the government will ask for a vote of confidence."

J. N. Robb Elected. Sault Ste Marie, Ont., Oct. 23.—At the nomination meeting at Thessalon Monday afternoon, no opposition was offered to Dr. J. N. Robb of Blind River, and he was therefore declared elected by acclamation to succeed Mr. Albert Grigg in the representation of the Algoma riding in the legislature.

Fisher for London. Melbourne, Australia, Oct. 26.—Andrew Fisher, the premier, has accepted the high commissionership for Australia in London, succeeding Sir George H. Reid. Mr. Fisher is recommended for his successor as premier, William Morris Hughes, attorney-general in the Fisher cabinet.

Italians Control Road Riva to Moro Bynago

Small Gain Also Recorded on Santa Pucia Heights, and Captured Casa Dirova Entrenchment—All Counter Attacks Repulsed—Enviros of Duino on Fire.

Rome, Oct. 25.—Via Paris, Oct. 26.—The official statement issued by the general headquarters of the Italian army under date of October 25th, says: "The zone situation between Lake Garda and Adige our troops descending from Monte Altissimo De Nago conquered the Riva fortifications on the 24th of the position of Dosse Cassina and Dossermit.
