WEST LAND REGULATIONS. THE sole head of a family, or any n over '18 years old, may homesten quarter-section of available Dominion him Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, plicant must appear in person at the minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency the District. Entry by proxy may be mat any Dominion Lands Agency (but Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of all least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

The area of cultivation is subject to rejuction in case of rough, scrubby or stony and. Live stock may be substituted for utilization under certain conditions.




