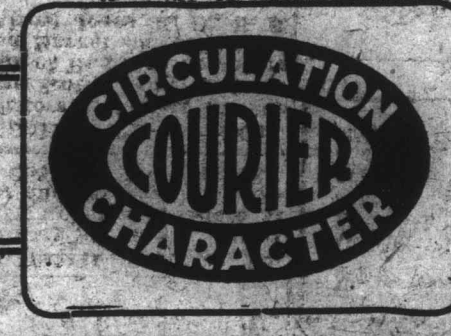

## The Passing of Puck

PUCK is dead. The familiar little figure with the leopold costume, modified by a swallow-tail coat and dent-top hat, set jauntily in a bunch of curls, whose motto was "What fools these mortals be," will no longer be seen on the title cover of the famous comic weekly of New York that so long bore his name. Puck died a natural death, of a complaint from which many of his kindred have suffered—lack of circulation.

The announcement of his passing arouses scarcely a ripple of interest in these days. But 10, 20, 30 years ago it would have been an event that would have caused a wave of regret to sweep over the country from the halls of the capital to the humblest hamlet in the land. And mingled with the regret there would have been likewise sonorous sighs of relief welling up from the haunts of New York statesmen and politicians.

For in the generations that knew Kelly and Foker and Dave Hill, bosses of the ancient time, and Butler, Hayes, Garfield, Blaine, Harrison, Conkling, statements of the vituperative era of politics, Puck was a power in United States politics, whose chromolithographic warms were more dreaded than the most trenchant editorial pen.

Puck's cartoons wrought havoc with political reputations and at least one great aspirant for the presidency—James C. Blaine—went down to defeat before his pictorial onslaught. It was in Puck's famous cartoon, "The Unravelling of Phyrus Before the Chicago Tribunal" that Blaine first appeared as the "Tattooed Man," which became a political sobriquet that helped ring the death knell to his presidential hopes.

Puck was the real pioneer in American comic journalism and in the development of the American colored cartoon as well. There had been many ventures in the line of humorous periodicals before his time, but they all died of non-support and lack of serious purpose. They were, for the most part, mere imitations of French and English periodicals and did not appeal to American taste.

Down to the launching of the first publication of Puck in English in New York, March, 1877, the purely comic paper as an American institution was unknown. Its entrance into the field of journalism marked the foundation of the modern school of political caricature, which has culminated in the American political cartoon. The founder and chief developer of that school, as it was first exploited in Puck and later in Judge, by the many-colored cartoons now so familiar to the American public, was a young artist and actor from Vienna, Joseph Keppler, who achieved fame and fortune from his venture. His career was rather a remarkable one in its earlier stages, full of the romance of struggling genius and evolution in the atmosphere of the red Bohemia.

As success came, Puck gradually drew to itself the best artistic talent in the country as well as some imitations from Keppler's native city, Vienna. Most of the famous cartoonists of early days, whose names became household words in America, were developed on the Puck staff—Gustav Oppel, Gilliam, Zimmerman, Dalrymple, Wales, Richards, Syd Griffin and Charles Taylor, and in recent years Joseph Keppler, the younger, Glasgow, Hamman, Levering, Arthur Young, Grant Hamilton, Gordon H. Grant, Will Crawford, Frank Mackintosh, Ralph Barton and Ray Van Buren, the last two of whom were at one time connected with the art department of the Kansas City Star. In Puck's last days, Bagmar, the Dutch cartoonist, was added to the staff in the hope of reviving its drooping popularity.
