HOME-MADE POLE DRAG.

For many uses I have found a pole drag a very serviceable implement; better than a roller because it will level and pulverize without packing the soil. It is made of three hardwood poles 6 inches in diameter and 7 1/2 feet long. The poles are fastened together about one foot apart by means of short pieces of chains. For a seat bolt a piece of board to the middle of the first pole and allow it to extend slightly beyond the last one. On this fasten an old mowing machine seat. This arrangement will hold the seat in place and allow the poles to work independently. The seat can be easily removed, making it much easier to store the drag when not in use. The drag may be drawn by a short chain attached to the centre of the first pole or the doubletree may be connected with chains from each end of the pole.—Orange Judd Farmer.


